

BOUNDARY CHANGE REQUEST

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Board Policy BBAB states that the Board will act as the Lane County School District Boundary Board and make changes in school district boundaries as defined and required by ORS 330.005 through 330.310. The following provisions of Board Policy #BBAB and Administrative Regulation BBAB-AR; Boundary Board are applicable:

Board Policy BBAB:

Boundaries shall not be changed except: ... by the mutual consent of the district school boards of the two or more affected districts in the manner prescribed in ORS 330.080 to 330.107.

The Board has received copies of approved minutes of Bethel School District 52 School Board and Eugene 4J School Board approving the request of Jeff and Donna Schimmer to transfer a parcel of property from Bethel to Eugene. The parcel in question consists of six individual parcels of property commonly known as 4490 Hyacinth, 4400 Hyacinth, 4416 Hyacinth, 4430 Hyacinth, 4472 Hyacinth, and an unimproved lot known as Lot 201 of the Tenth Addition to Bell Estates. The combined legal description of the property is attached.

Mr and Mrs Schimmer, the chief petitioners for the change, own the property at 4490 Hyacinth. Each property owner was notified by School District 4J prior to the 4J Board's approval of this request to the Boundary Board. This agenda has also been sent to each property owner.

Reason for request for change: (See attachment 1A)

Administrative Regulation BBAB-AR

The Boundary Board shall ... change the boundaries of school districts upon: 1. The request of the district school boards of the affected school districts.

The request from the district school boards shall be in the form of a copy of the Board resolution or official minutes of the meeting requesting or approving the proposed change.

The Board finds that the request to transfer this property was unanimously approved by the Bethel School District 52 Board of Directors on June 14, 1993, and by the Eugene 4J District 4J Board on August 18, 1993. (attachments 1A and 1B)

If only a portion of the school district is involved, the request shall include a legal description of the property for which the change is requested. No boundary change or merger shall be made which results in a school district that consists of noncontiguous areas.

A combined legal description and map of the property were submitted. The Board finds that the property is contiguous to the Eugene District 4J. (attachments 2A and 2B)

Before the proposed change or merger is considered, the Boundary Board shall give notice in the Register-Guard (a general circulation newspaper in the county in which the hearing is to be held). In accordance with timelines provided in ORS 330.635, the notice shall be published no sooner than the 25th day nor later than the 15th day before the hearing and the last publication shall be not sooner than the 14th day or later than the eighth day before the hearing.

Notice of this hearing was published in the <u>Register-Guard</u> in accordance with statutes. (attachment 3)



We, the undersigned property owners, wish to have the school boundary changed from the Bethel School District to the Eugene 4J School District. The house in question is in the Bell Estates neighborhood. Currently, every other house in Bell Estates neighborhood is in the 4J district, except for the five houses and one lot on the west side of Hyacinth. A similar request was granted recently for houses in the new cul-de-sac at the other end of Hyacinth (Lots 243, 244, 245 and 246 on attached map). Jeff and Donna Schimmer have spoken with Mr. Hunsaker of the Bethel District and Mr. Stevens of the 4J District and they both seemed receptive to this boundary change.

Jeff and Donna Schimmer recently purchased the house at 4490 Hyacinth. They have 3 children who are finishing out the school year at Madison and Spring Creek in 4J. These kids have been in the 4J school district since kindergarten, except for 1 year when they temporarily moved to Boise, Id. Next year, Jacob Schimmer will be in high school, Katie Schimmer will be in middle school and Lyda Schimmer will be in grammar school. Transportation costs would be greatly reduced if they could take the 4J bus which already comes to the neighborhood. This petition is an effort to allow these children to play with children in their neighborhood both at home and at school. The closest house in the Bethel district is in the Lynbrook II sub-division. We are also concerned about the safety factor of transporting children across two railroad lines and across two very busy highways - Beltline and Northwest Expressway.

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Board Policy BBAB states that the Board will act as the Lane County School District Boundary Board and make changes in school district boundaries as defined and required by ORS 330.005 through 330.310. The following provisions of Board Policy #BBAB and Administrative Regulation BBAB-AR; Boundary Board are applicable:

Board Policy BBAB:

Boundaries shall not be changed except: ... by the mutual consent of the district school boards of the two or more affected districts in the manner prescribed in ORS 330.080 to 330.107.

The Board has received copies of approved minutes of Bethel School District 52 School Board and Eugene 4J School Board approving the request of Mr Steve Lee to transfer a parcel of property from Bethel to Eugene. The legal description of the property is attached.

Summary of reason for change: Mr Lee is developing a 185 lot subdivision in this area. Sixteen of the lots in the subdivision are within the Bethel School District boundaries; the remainder of the development is in Eugene 4J. Mr Lee said that he is attempting to create a neighborhood and it seems inappropriate to have an island of 16 lots within a different school district.





PROGRAM

DISTRICT BOUNDARY BOARD

It is the policy of the Board to act as District Boundary Board and to make changes in school district boundaries as defined and required by ORS 330.005 through 330.310.

Boundaries shall not be changed except:

- 1. Pursuant to ORS 330.090(1) and (2).
- 2. By a vote of the people pursuant to:
 - a. ORS 330.505 to 330.780;
 - b. ORS Chapter 334; or
 - c. The lengthening of the course of study under ORS Chapter 335.
- 3. By the mutual consent of the district school boards of the two or more affected districts in the manner prescribed in ORS 330.080 to 330.107.
- 4. On a request for change or merger proposal submitted to the district boundary board by electors of the affected districts in the manner prescribed in ORS 330.080 to 330.107.

The Superintendent shall develop procedures which will insure adherence to this policy, statutes, and the Oregon Administrative Rules.

The term "significant adverse impact" as used in ORS 330.090(5) is defined as follows:

The impact on the financing or provision of educational programs and services in the affected districts would be of sufficient importance as to have some observable negative effect upon the education program of the affected district or area.

The Board, convening as the District Boundary Board, shall act upon all legal petitions duly and properly filed with the Board. The Board may upon its own motion alter boundaries for purposes of improving the education of children when there exist natural barriers, problems of accessibility, or other circumstances which the Board deems reasonable and sufficient.

Lane Education Service District

DISTRICT BOUNDARY BOARD

1106-1: [ORS 330.080]

The Board shall clearly separate its deliberations and actions as the District Boundary Board from its deliberations and actions as the Education Service District Board with regard to:

- 1. Calling and announcement of meetings
- 2. Agenda
- 3. Minutes

1106-2:

In accordance with Board Policy 106 and ORS 330.080(2), the Board directs the Superintendent to develop and maintain legal descriptions, maps, and other documents necessary to show and define the boundaries of all constituent local school districts, based on records of the County Assessor.

1106-3:

The Superintendent shall provide or arrange for assistance as appropriate to the parties involved in proposed changes. Reasonable charges may be made for services provided, for the purpose of recovering the actual cost of providing such services.

Procedures for Boundary change shall be developed according to Oregon statutes and shall be presented to persons inquiring about Boundary changes. Said procedures are incorporated as a part of these Administrative Rules (Attachment A).

- Twenty-five percent of the electors, but no fewer than three nor more than 25 signatures shall be required:

As provided in the above statute, the Board may direct a school district to be merged with an adjoining school district designated by the Board if it finds that continuation of the district is not required because of geographic factors affecting transportation or because of sparsity of population and if:

1. The probable effect of the proposed change on the ability of affected school districts to maintain a standard program, according to Oregon Board of Education standards.

The Board may consider other relevant evidence, if any, submitted by the boards of the affected districts, by other persons having a direct interest or by staff.

The Boundary Board shall merge smaller districts into larger districts or shall change the boundaries of school districts upon:

1. The request of the district school boards of the affected school districts.

ORS 330.095(1)(a)(b)(c)

The request from the district school boards shall be in the form of a copy of the Board resolution or official minutes of the meeting requesting or approving the proposed change.

It shall contain the names and numbers of the affected districts, a concise statement of the type of change requested, and proposals for: (a) distribution of debt, if any; and (b) retirement of unexpired serial levies, if any, or continuance of such levies against all taxable property in the enlarged district.

If only a portion of the school district is involved, the request shall also include a legal description of the property for which the change is requested.

- The effect of the proposed change upon the property tax rate(s) within the area affected.

- The effect of the proposed change upon the amount of taxable assessed valuation per resident average daily membership (ADMr) in the affected districts.

The Boundary Board shall merge smaller districts into larger districts or shall change the boundaries of school districts upon:

1. A petition of five percent or 500 electors of each affected district, whichever is less.

If a petition of electors from affected districts is involved, the petition shall contain the names and numbers of the affected districts and a concise statement of the type of change requested.

The petition shall contain proposals for: (a) distribution of debt, if any; and (b) retirement of unexpired serial levies, if any, or continuance of such levies against all taxable property in the enlarged district.

If only a portion of the school district is involved the request shall also include a legal description.

The petition shall also contain signatures and resident addresses of the petitioners and the names of the school district in which they reside.

(PROCEEDINGS OF THIS HEARING WERE TAPED AND THE RECORDING IS MADE A PART OF THE PUBLIC RECORD OF THIS MEETING.)

3. Chairperson Copple opened the Hearing on the petition for a school district boundary change brought by Larry Lee. She welcomed those attending, who were Larry Lee, the petitioner and his wife, Laurel Lee; Tim Keeley, Assistant Superintendent, Bethel School District, opposing the petition; and Chuck Stolsig, Eugene School District. (Mr. Stolsig said he was attending as an observer and would not offer testimony.) The Chairperson briefly reviewed the agenda and timeline for the Hearing as distributed.

Board members indicated no ex parte contacts or possible conflicts of interest in this matter. Chairperson Copple then asked the Superintendent to review the petition and Board procedures.

Superintendent Maxwell stated that the completed petition in this matter was delivered to the staff on May 18, 1989, by Larry Lee. It involves a 1.37 acre parcel of property owned by Larry Lee, who is purchasing the property from Lane County. The property is part of the Tenth Addition to Bell Estates and is undeveloped. It is in the Bethel District and is contiguous to the Eugene District. The petition requests that the school district be changed from Bethel School District 52 to Eugene District 4J.

The Hearing date for this petition was set by Board action on May 23, 1989. As required by statute, staff requested both affected school districts to provide background information. In accordance with Oregon Board of Education rule, a settlement conference was held on June 16, 1989. The parties did not agree on a recommended settlement. Notice of this Hearing was published in accordance with statutory requirements. The following materials had been mailed to all interested parties prior to this Hearing:

- . Copies of the Agenda, Hearing Procedures, and Timeline
 - Background information prepared by the staff
- . Copy of the original petition with map
- . A resolution from the Bethel School Board opposing the change
 - A written statement from Larry Lee received at this Hearing was distributed and is also made a part of the record of this Hearing.

(A copy of the Hearing timeline and procedures is attached to the official copy of these minutes.)

Superintendent Maxwell then reviewed the statutory criteria which the Board must consider in reaching its decision.

4. Testimony and Argument

Testimony and Argument

(All testimony and questions as well as Board deliberation following was tape-recorded. The recording is available through the Superintendent's Office and is made a part of the official record of this Hearing.)

- 4A. Neither side wished to present an Opening Statement.
- 4B. Petitioner Larry Lee, of 4852 Herman Street, was sworn in and presented his testimony. Mr. Lee called attention to written information which he distributed. He pointed out on a map that two of the other parcels in the proposed development, which is a culdesac, are in the Eugene District, while one lies on the Bethel side of the boundary. He said he did not wish the development to be divided into two districts. He also discussed the proximity of the property to schools in both districts.

Tim Keeley waived cross-examination. Questions from Board members followed.

4C. Tim Keeley, representing Superintendent Kent Hunsaker of the Bethel School District was then sworn in and presented testimony in opposition to the proposed change. He stated that the district fears that this boundary change could open floodgates to further requests. The District believes that Hyacinth Street is a natural boundary between the two districts. He stated that the District provides safe transportation to all students. Mr. Keeley said the District did understand Mr. Lee's position and did not want its opposition to be interpreted as antagonistic.

In cross-examination of the witness, Mr. Lee pointed out several reasons for his belief that this change would not cause other property owners in the area to request boundary changes.

Following Board questioning of Mr. Keeley, Chairperson Copple declared the record of testimony closed.

4D. Larry Lee presented a closing statement, saying that he believed the petition met the statutory criteria and briefly summarizing his earlier statements.

Tim Keeley did not present a closing statement.

5. <u>Deliberation and</u> Actions

5. Chairperson Copple stated that it was time for the Board to begin deliberations based on requirements of ORS 330.090(4). Director Weathers said he believed the testimony of Mr. Lee covered the statutory criteria quite thoroughly and said that he would move to find that all of the statutory criteria had been met. Director Swanson said he agreed for the most part but felt the facts should be entered into the record. He said he felt that the only issue to be deliberated was that given in ORS 330.090(5) and that criteria should be looked at separately.

5. <u>Deliberations and Action</u> (continued)

DIRECTOR WEATHERS MOVED:

The Lane County School District Boundary Board accepts as presented written and verbal testimony provided at this Hearing and on the basis of that testimony finds that statutory criteria 330.090(3)(a); 330.090(4)(a); 330.090(4)(b); 330.090(4)(c); 330.090(4)(d); 330.090(4)(e); and 330.090(7) have been met by the petitioners.

Director Swanson seconded and the MOTION CARRIED WITH DIRECTORS COPPLE, LEWELLEN, MEDFORD, NEARING, SWANSON, and WEATHERS VOTING YES.

The Board then deliberated on testimony presented regarding statutory criteria 330.090(5), which deals with cumulative impact of the proposed change. (See Findings of Fact document attached.)

DIRECTOR SWANSON MOVED:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Lane County School District Boundary Board finds that the cumulative impact of the boundary change as proposed by Larry Lee would have no significant adverse impact on the financing or provision of educational programs and services in the affected districts or areas involved.

Director Weathers seconded and the MOTION CARRIED WITH DIRECTORS COPPLE, LEWELLEN, MEDFORD, NEARING, SWANSON, and WEATHERS VOTING YES.

DIRECTOR SWANSON MOVED:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Lane County School District Boundary Board has arrived at a Finding of Fact and Conclusion of Law for each of the criteria required by ORS 330.090. Based on these Findings, the Board concludes that the statutory criteria have been satisfied and the boundary change petition filed by LARRY LEE is hereby APPROVED.

Director Medford seconded and the MOTION CARRIED WITH DIRECTORS COPPLE, LEWELLEN, MEDFORD, NEARING, SWANSON, and WEATHERS VOTING YES.

To the knowledge of the staff, there are no other petitions currently being circulated involving Bethel School District.

The opposing witness (for the Bethel School District) stated that the District feared granting this petition would "open the floodgates" to further requests for changes; however he knew of no parties who planned to file such a petition.

The petitioner testified that he had spoken with other property owners adjacent and near the petitioned property and none of them wish or plan to initiate petitions to change school districts. No other evidence was presented to show that any other parties planned or desired to file similar boundary changes in the future.

Property value for the one previous change in this area was \$79,900. The value of the currently petitioned property is \$9,870. No testimony was offered to show that these two changes would constitute a cumulative impact. No evidence was presented to show that development of this property would have a significant impact on the Bethel District.



1B. Director Swanson moved to approve the Boundary Board minutes of May 23, 1989, including Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law and Final Order in the matter of the petition for boundary change brought by Edward V. (Ned) Wright.

Director Weathers seconded and the MOTION CARRIED WITH ALL PRESENT VOTING YES.

BOUNDARY CHANGE HEARING ON PETITION FILED BY WILLIAM TEUSCHER

(PROCEEDINGS OF THIS HEARING WERE TAPED AND THE RECORDING IS MADE A PART OF THE PUBLIC RECORD OF THIS MEETING.)

2. Boundary Board Hearing

2. Chairperson Copple opened the Hearing on the petition for a school district boundary change brought by William Teuscher to merge Lowell District 71 with Springfield School District 19. She welcomed those attending.

Ex parte contacts or possible conflicts of interest in this matter were indicated by Board members Doug McKay and Lois Copple. This list is attached to the official copy of the minutes of this meeting.

2A. Review of Petition and Background

2A. Chairperson Copple noted that William Teuscher had indicated he would serve as chief spokesperson for the petitioners and that Dan Parks would be chief spokesperson for the opponents. She asked others who wished to testify to step to the table to sign in.

Superintendent Maxwell briefly reviewed the petition and Board procedures. He said that all persons who indicated an interest in this hearing had received copies of the agenda packet which was sent to Board members. He pointed out that the Board must make its decision based on well-defined points of the law and noted that copies of these statutory considerations, as well as the Board's adopted hearing procedures and timeline, were available for audience members.

Milt Baum, Associate Superintendent of the State Department of Education, provided background on the history of school district organization in the state and legislation affecting boundary changes. He reviewed the process for bringing a petition, including the Boundary Board Hearing process and legislative provisions for a vote by the people if a petition for change is approved.

Joe Richards, legal Counsel for the Boundary Board, then reviewed the statutory points which the Board must consider in its deliberation and the Board's adopted administrative regulations for making its decision. He pointed out that the Board would be most interested in testimony speaking to the first three points of the criteria, since by nature of this petition, the remaining points are not applicable.

Superintendent Maxwell then reviewed background of this petition and provided a summary of documents which were included in the agenda mailing packet as follows:

- 1. Preliminary Background information prepared by the staff.
- 2. Copy of petition submitted by William Teuscher. (Exhibit A)
- 3. Information from Lowell School District 71 and a letter from Lowell patron Jim Peters opposing the change. (Exhibit B1 and B2)
- Information from Springfield School District in opposition to the proposed change. (Exhibit C)
 (A memo from Superintendent Paul Plath stating the Springfield School Board's June 12 action to oppose the proposed change was added to the district staff recommendation which was included in the agenda packet.)

Testimony and Argument

3A. William Teuscher stated that the cover letter included in the petition, which was the letter he took when his committee gathered signatures, would serve as his opening statement.

Dan Parks stated that the Lowell Board had gone on record as opposing the merger. He said that most of the information he wished the Board to consider was included in the background data sent to Board members.

3B. Petitioner William R. Teuscher, 39287 Jasper-Lowell Road, Lowell, was sworn in and provided testimony.

The Board also heard testimony in support of the proposed change from the following witnesses, after each was sworn in by the Chairperson:

Mr. Parks waived cross-examination of any of the proponent witnesses. Board members had no questions at this time.

Dan Parks, Lowell Board Chairperson, of 40352 Reuben Leigh Road, the chief spokesperson for the opponents, was sworn in and provided testimony.

The Board also heard testimony from the following witnesses in opposition to the proposed change, after each was sworn in by the Chairperson:

Mr. Teuscher cross-examined Don Shutt regarding his testimony on length of bus trips and school attendance areas.

3. Testimony and Argument (continued)

Director Swanson asked questions of Dan Parks regarding enrollment and drop-out statistics provided by the District. Mr. Parks requested that the question be deferred to the Lowell District Superintendent.

Chairperson Copple swore in Ron Johnson, Superintendent of Lowell School District 71, 40391 Reuben Leigh Road, who provided testimony in answer to Director Swanson's question as well as subsequent questions from Director Nearing.

Directors Swanson and Nearing asked Don Shutt questions about the ability of the Springfield School District to provide programs required by law and the impact on present students if the merger were to take place.

Director McKay asked about projected enrollment in the Lowell attendance area. Vicki Riggs, 39547 Place Road, Fall Creek, was sworn in and provided her opinion.

Director Nearing said that as a result of Mr. Parks' testimony, he now would like to ask some questions of petitioner William Teuscher. Mr. Teuscher returned to the table to answer questions from Directors Nearing and Swanson about his reasons for filing the petition.

Record of Testimony closed

Chairperson Copple declared that the record of testimony was now closed.

The taped recording of the testimony and questions is available through the Superintendent's office and is made a part of the official record of this Hearing.

Closing Statements

3E. Closing statements

Mr. Teuscher gave the closing statement for the proponents. He urged the Board to consider the change because the merger would provide the best education for Lowell children in today's world and that the advantages of the merger would far outweigh the disadvantages. He said he hoped the Board would vote in favor of the petition, thereby allowing the constituency to decide the issue.

Mr. Parks gave the closing statement for the opponents. He said it is the firm belief of the Lowell District Administration and Board that the district is serving its children well and they do not believe that negative factors would be outweighed by any positive aspects there might be to the change.

Recess Declared

4. Chairperson Copple stated that the Board would begin deliberations based on requirements of ORS 330.090(4) following a 10-minute recess.

Meeting Reconvened

Chairperson Copple reconvened the Board reconvened at 9:30 p.m.



4. Board Deliberations

 Director Swanson said he believed that testimony had eliminated the need to deliberate on several of the statutory criteria upon which the Board's decision is to be based. In order that the Board could focus its discussion on the remaining criteria,

DIRECTOR SWANSON MOVED as follows:

On the basis of written and verbal testimony provided at this hearing, the Lane County School District Boundary Board finds as follows:

- (a) The proposed change would have no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the districts affected to provide the educational programs required by law.
- (b) The proposed change is not made solely for tax advantages to the property owners in the district or area affected by the proposed change
- (c) The proposed change would not result in territory of a district becoming noncontiguous; and
- (d) The proposed change would not result in a district having less than 20 children of school age.

Director Lewellen seconded and the MOTION CARRIED WITH DIRECTORS COPPLE, LEWELLEN, McKAY, NEARING, SWANSON, and WEATHERS VOTING YES.

Board members then deliberated on ORS 330.090(4)(b), citing primarily evidence on this issue which was offered in writing by the Springfield School District (Exhibit C attached to these minutes) and reiterated by Don Shutt's testimony during the hearing.

DIRECTOR WEATHERS MOVED as follows:

The Lane County School District Boundary Board has found evidence that the proposed change would be likely to adversely affect the educational programs available to children in the areas affected by the proposed change.

Director Swanson seconded and THE MOTION CARRIED WITH DIRECTORS COPPLE, LEWELLEN, McKAY, NEARING, SWANSON, and WEATHERS VOTING YES.

Director Nearing told the petitioners that although he voted in favor of this motion because of the evidence offered, he sympathized with their desires. He said that he believed that some of the problems which they cited needed to be addressed on a statewide level.

Joe Richards advised the Board at this point that it was no longer necessary to deliberate on the remaining subsection of the statute (ORS 330.090(5), since according to statute the change must be denied based on the above finding.

5. Board Findings

5. DIRECTOR SWANSON MOVED:

BE IT RESOLVED that the Lane County School District Boundary Board has arrived at a Finding of Fact for each of the criteria required by ORS 330.090. Based on these Findings of Fact, the Boundary Change Petition filed by William R. Teuscher is hereby denied.

Director Weathers seconded and THE MOTION CARRIED WITH DIRECTORS COPPLE, LEWELLEN, McKAY, NEARING, SWANSON, and WEATHERS VOTING YES.



BOUNDARY BOARD STATUTORY CONSIDERATION

330.090(4) The district boundary board shall order the change if it finds that the proposed change:

- (a) Will have no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the districts affected to provide the educational program required by law.
- (b) Is not likely to adversely affect the educational programs available to the children in the area affected by the proposed change.
- (c) Is not made solely for tax advantages to the property owners in the district or area affected by the proposed change.

- (d) Is not likely to adversely affect any contemplated reorganization under ORS 330.505 to 330.780.

330.090(7) No change shall be made which results in a district having less than 20 children of school age.

.330.090(5) Notwithstanding subsection (4) of this section, the boundary board may deny a boundary change if it finds that the cumulative impact of the proposed change, prior boundary changes and future boundary changes that are being contemplated or expected to be proposed would have a significant adverse impact, as defined by policies of the boundary board, on the financing or provision of educational programs and services in the affected districts or areas involved.

"Significant adverse impact" as defined by the Lane County School District
Boundary Board is: "The impact on the financing or provision of educational
programs and services in the affected districts would be of sufficient importance
as to have some observable negative effect upon the education program of the

Hearing Procedures

At the scheduled hearing the Board will proceed as follows:

- 1. The Board will first receive written and oral testimony from the proponents and then from the opponents of the proposed boundary change, including the school districts affected by the proposed change. There shall be no rebuttal by any party. Parties have the right to representation in their presentation to the Board. Each party shall have the right to examine and cross-examine witnesses individually, with the understanding that all petitioners shall be treated as one party, for the purpose of this provision. Board members may ask questions of witnesses.
- Testimony shall be given under oath with the following oath administered by the Chair: "In the testimony you are about to give do you swear or affirm that the testimony is true?"
- 3. At conclusion of the presentation of the testimony the District Board, at its option, may grant time for closing remarks to the proponents and the opponents. At all stages of the proceedings, the District Boundary Board may set reasonable time limits.
- 4. At the conclusion of the testimony and closing remarks, the District Boundary Board shall act upon the evidence presented and render a decision on the petition within the time permitted by law.

2. Probable impact of such increases or decreases.

1988 Rate, Lane County Tax Rolls:

According to calculations by the State Department of Education, if this merger had taken place this year, the State Apportionment of Basic School Support Funds to the merged districts would have been \$13,545,224.16: This is one cent more than the total amount received by the two districts. (Springfield: \$12,868,563.30, Lowell: \$676,660.85)

3. Effect upon property tax rates within affected school districts.

Both districts levied within their allowed tax base which includes 6% growth for 1988-89. According to information available to staff at this time, the Lowell District has no outstanding debt, and Springfield has a bonded indebtedness of \$4,520,000.

If change has been in effect:

4. Other relevant information submitted by the affected local districts or others

Don Shutt, Springfield District Assistant Superintendent, testified that Springfield District would be able to provide the educational programs required by law if this change were to be made.

THE BOARD CONCLUDES that the proposed change would not adversely affect either districts' ability to provide basic educational programs required by law.

Teuscher

1. Type of petition.

This petition to merge Lowell School District #71 with Springfield District #19 was submitted on March 23 by William Teuscher. It is signed by 322 persons. Through Lane County Regional Information System, our staff has verified 215 of these as registered voters in the Lowell School District. (Some of the other signatures cannot be checked because they are illegible.) According to Lane County Elections Department, there were 1,055 registered voters in Lowell School District (as of 2/28/89).

Staff recommends that the Board accept the petition as a valid petition under provisions of ORS 330.090(3)(b):

"Petitions shall be signed by 25% of the electors but no fewer than three nor more than 25 shall be required."

2. Other staff findings relative to petition.

- a. The Board has scheduled this Hearing for Tuesday, June 13, at 7:30 p.m.
- b. A pre-hearing conference was held at 3 p.m., Thursday, April 20, at the ESD Center, in accordance with Oregon Board of Education rule [OAR 581-005(3)]. The parties did not agree on a recommended settlement.
- c. Notice of this Hearing was published in the <u>Register-Guard</u> on May 24 and June 2, in accordance with statutory requirements.

THE BOARD CONCLUDES that this petition, as submitted, is valid, and accepts it under provisions of 330.090 (3)(b).

(ORS 330.090(4)(c). Is not made solely for tax advantages to the property owners in the district or area affected by the proposed change.)

1. Effect of proposed change upon the property tax rate(s) within affected districts.

According to Pat Siegmund, Lane County Department of Assessment and Taxation, the property tax rate, if this merger is approved, would be calculated using the annexation formula provided by the Department of Revenue.

Using that formula, and 1988 tax roll rates without assuming any subsequent changes, the adjusted tax base (for 1988) would have been \$25,574,649.95. The tax rate would have been \$18.79.

3. Other relevant evidence submitted by the affected local districts or others

Testimony was presented by the petitioner, William Teuscher, that the change was being requested primarily because of concern for educational opportunities for the children in the Lowell School District. Although the petitioners would have a lower tax rate if the petition were granted, he said that was not the primary reason for requesting the change.

THE BOARD CONCLUDES that the boundary change request was not made solely for tax advantages to the property owners in the district or area affected by the proposed change.

Touscher

(ORS 330.090(4)(b). Is not likely to adversely affect the educational programs available to children in the area affected.) District Policy (Administrative Regulation 1106-6) provides as follows with respect to ORS 330.090(4)(b): "In making its findings relative to the above criterion, the Board will consider the probable effect of the proposed change on the ability of affected school districts to maintain a standard program, according to Oregon Board of Education standards. The Board may consider other relevant evidence, if any, submitted by the boards of the affected districts, by other persons having a direct interest, or by staff."

1. The Board finds the following evidence submitted by the affected local districts or others is relevant:

The following testimony was provided by Don Shutt, Assistant Superintendent, Springfield School District 19:

The 111 students in grades 6-8 would be transported to existing middle schools in Springfield. It would be very difficult, and not efficient, to duplicate existing middle school programs at Lowell for a facility housing only 111 students. The existing educational program would need to be changed and the current school attendance boundaries would need to be altered in order to accommodate 111 additional students.

If school attendance boundaries were not altered, Lowell students would need to be bussed to each of the Springfield middle schools in order to more evenly distribute students and thereby lessen the impact on any one school. If Lowell students were bussed to all middle schools in Springfield, some students would be spending considerable time being transported to and from school. If Lowell students in grades 6 to 8 were divided among the four middle schools in Springfield, some students would be spending an additional two to three hours each day riding a bus. The potential exists that the long daily bus rides could increase the number of students dropping out of school.

Lowell students being transported to Springfield schools would be spending an additional 60 to 90 minutes per day riding a bus. This would mean that a student enrolled in zero period classes and after school activities could be leaving home at 5:30 a.m. and returning home at 7:30 p.m. Evidence presented indicated that such a long day could adversely affect students.

Since instructional materials used in Lowell are not the same as those used in Springfield, Lowell students would have to adapt to new instructional programs. Changing all instructional programs on students in a single year would negatively affect students' performance.

The Lowell School District Board and the Springfield School District Board opposed the merger.

THE BOARD CONCLUDES that the proposed change is likely to adversely affect the educational programs available to children in the area affected.

2A. Opening statements were presented by Jane Wright for the petitioners and Don Hopkins for the opponents.

Ms. Wright said that she and her husband were not looking at taxes but at the best educational benefits for their children. She said her daughter attends Springfield schools on an exchange option, but she is concerned that this may not be available in the future. She said they are pleased with Springfield schools and feel that Marcola District cannot offer the same quality of education. She said she believed the petition met the stated criteria and cited a past petition in the same general area which the Board had granted.

Superintendent Hopkins said he did not have a great deal to add to his March 9 letter; he reiterated statements in the letter stating that he did not believe that the petition met the criteria for a boundary change. He said the Marcola School Board was on record as being unanimously opposed to this change.

- 2B. Petitioner Jane Alison Wright was sworn in and presented her testimony. Don Hopkins waived cross-examination. The testimony was followed by Board questions. Petitioner Edward V. 

1. Type of petition.

This petition was submitted on February 7, 1989, by Edward V. (Ned) Wright, as a 100% petition under ORS 330.090(3)(a) which states that the petition shall be signed by anyone residing, owning, or occupying real property within the petitioned area. It was signed by Edward V. and Jane A. Wright.

Lane County tax rolls show that Edward V. Wright is purchasing the 6+ acre parcel on a land sales contract from Emery and Hazel Cochran. The Wrights pay the taxes. The signature of the seller under a land sales contract is not required in order to qualify as a 100% petition.

Edward and Jane Wright are the only registered voters listed at this address.

2. Other staff findings relative to petition.

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

(Validity of Petition.)

Type of petition.

The petition was submitted February 5 by Pam Cory, on behalf of three signers. According to Lane County Elections Department, there are ten registered voters in the petitioned area. Three of the ten (30%) have signed the petition, which was accepted as a "25 percent" petition under provisions of ORS 330.090(3)(b).

2. Other staff findings relative to petition.

The petition, including legal description and map, has been verified and is complete and valid.

3. Other relevant evidence submitted by the affected local districts or others.

In accordance with statute, the staff notified both affected districts of the Hearing and requested background information.

Property owners and registered voters within the petitioned area were also notified.

Written responses received were distributed to Board members and are made a part of the record of this Hearing.

THE BOARD CONCLUDES THAT THE PETITION AS SUBMITTED IS VALID, UNDER PROVISIONS OF ORS 330.090(3)(b).

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

(ORS 330.090(4)(a). The change will have no substantial adverse affect upon the ability of the districts affected to provide the educational programs required by law.)

1. Increase or decrease in number of students enrolled.

According to testimony, seven children reside in the petitioned area. Five are of school age and currently attend schools in the Eugene School District or non-public schools located within the Eugene District boundaries.

(Two children are preschoolers.)

2. Probable impact of such increases or decreases.

According to testimony presented, there would be no significant impact due to change in enrollment at this time.

3. Effect upon property tax rates within affected school districts.

If this change had been in effect in 1987, Creswell's tax rate would have increased 31¢ (from 22.84 to 23.15).

Eugene's would have decreased 2¢ (from 17.44 to 17.42.)

4. Recommendations and other relevant evidence submitted by the affected local districts or others.

Written documentation and testimony from Creswell District 40 indicates that this change would result in approximately \$37,000 of property taxes paid on behalf of the petitioned area to become the responsibility of the remaining property owners in the District. If this added tax burden could not be collected, it could result in the loss of one elementary teacher position, causing a substantial increase in the teacher-student ratio. It was also indicated that the loss could require cuts to programs that would put the district into non-compliance with State standards.

Testimony was also offered that natural fluctuations in tax rates can occur from year to year.

THE BOARD CONCLUDES THAT THE PROPOSED CHANGE WOULD HAVE A SUBSTANTIAL ADVERSE AFFECT UPON THE ABILILTY OF CRESWELL DISTRICT 40 TO PROVIDE EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS REQUIRED BY LAW.

The Superintendent said that the Board's findings would be based on Oregon statutes. He called attention to maps of the area provided by petitioners and pointed out the property on the school district boundary map.



The last action on this parcel of property occurred on January 22, 1985, at which time the Board determined that the "ESD's potential uses of the property are too tenuous to make purchase a prudent course of action."

Since no facility needs have surfaced in the ensuing nineteen months, the Superintendent recommended that the Board decline Mr. Hanson's invitation to consider purchase of the property.

Board members discussed the issue and agreed by consensus with the Superintendent's recommendation.


- b. The petioners believe that Ham Road east of the property being petitioned for change is too steep and curved for safe school bus travel.
- c. Communication services--telephone, mail-come from Lorane.
- d. Social life of all the residents is centered in Lorane. It was held to be important for children to go to the same school as children with whom they play.
- e. It is not believed that transfer of this small parcel would have an adverse economic effect on Creswell District 40 or its educational program.

(At this point, Chairman Billings stated a former client was in the audience but that he and the client had at no time discussed school matters.)

District 40 Superintendent Don Rees responded to petitioners' concerns:

"a" District 66's denial of non-resident family requests was made in order to avoid establishing a precedent. The one exception was made in order to complete in good faith decisions of former superintendents of the two districts concerning what was then an isolated request.

Mr. Rees stated that the people involved had requested District 40 to provide tuition payment to District 66. This is not possible but bus transportation to Creswell was extended to the area in question.

- "b" Road grade and curves have not presented a problem. Paved roads in the area also have curves and could be considered as dangerous.
- "d" The situation of children attending school with one group and socializing with another group at home is a common occurrence in most districts it is not unique to this area.
- "e" Operating economies is a major concern.

 District 40 cannot justify loss of present
 or potential taxable property.

Jackie Yeager testified that the section line which is the present school district boundary is the division between east and west Lane Board of Commissioner zones. A boundary change could make it necessary to travel to two election precincts to vote.

Mrs. Yeager did not consider the roads in question more dangerous than any of the area roads and stated there has not been a bus accident. She further indicated the petitioners were aware of district boundaries when they moved there. She opposed jerrymandering of boundary lines and did not wish to change business and school alliances.

Jim Heaton, vice-chairman of the Creswell School Board and a real estate agent, testified that the \$155,000 valuation is undoubtedly low and the real value is probably closer to \$404,000. He further indicated his conviction that the assessed valuation would rise in the not-too-distant future.

The Boundary Board posed questions regarding teacherpupil ratio, per pupil costs, road conditions, etc.

Chairman Billings declared a 10-minute recess.

Chairman Billings declared the Boundary Hearing back in session at 9:50 p.m.

The Board contended that the degree of road dangers and importance of social environment were value judgments and, as such, not germaine to the five statutory criteria upon which boundary changes are granted or denied.

Indications are that the remainder of the subdivision will be petitioned for Boundary Board reconsideration in the near future.

Witnesses were sworn as they testified and their statements recorded. The recording will become part of the public record.

Testimony Supporting Transfer Petitioner Louis Marzano and attorney Tom Evans reasoned the petition should be approved because:

- a. All lots that are practically available have been sold, with all children in the subdivision excepting the Marzano's to be resident in that part of the subdivision which is within District 4J. Denial of the request would force separation of the Marzano's from the others. (This circumstance relates to present conditions and known current property owners.)
- b. The Marzano children are presently attending Eugene schools, one is in an accelerated program; they wish to continue in these schools.
- c. The Marzanos' professional and social life is centered in Eugene. It would be impractical to attend social functions outside of Dr. Marzano's radius of practice, because of the need to be on-call.



d. The property when purchased was represented by the developer as being in 4J. In reality, it is on a split code with that portion lying in District 4J being unsuited as a building site, due to its relationship to the authorized septic tank location. Considerable financial commitments have been made to date (architects, well, etc).

The petitioner believed that approval would not have an adverse effect on either district; that the change would provide better educational opportunities; and that his petition should be heard on its own merit.

Attorney John Luvaas, Superintendent Don Rees, and Board member Jim Heaton reasoned the petition should be denied because:

- a. Approval of one lot sets precedent for rehearing the remainder of the original petition, either piece-meal or as a unit. Any loss--small or large--of assessed property valuation would prove to have a substantial adverse effect upon Creswell's ability to provide an adequate educational program.
- b. Creswell, with lowest T.C.V. in the county, faces an increasing enrollment and an upcoming building program. It will be difficult to obtain favorable rating for bonds to build if prime property is chipped away one piece at a time.
- c. In order to obtain bonding, Creswell must certify that boundaries are not in dispute. Creswell boundaries will be uncertain for a long period of time if petitions are presented one after another.
- d. If the petition is approved, the two districts must apportion all liabilities and assets (ORS 330.123) in relation to percentage of property removed. This would be extremely costly to Creswell. (Examples were cited.)
- e. 100% petitions takes away Creswell's right to vote on the matter.

f. Exhibits were presented showing Creswell's leadership in provision of basic education. The 1978 state-wide assessment of reading and computing programs placed Creswell fourth graders in upper 4% of state. It was noted there are many opportunities available to students in a small district.



5. IED Legislation

- 5. The Superintendent stated he had attended a House Revenue Committee meeting regarding future funding of IEDs. He indicated that when the Governor's school finance plan was first introduced, the chairman of the committee, Dr. Howard Cherry, proposed that IEDs be funded jointly by local school districts and the State Department of Education (resolutions out of monies allocated to local districts and the remaining administrative cost from the state general fund through the State Department of Education). The Superintendent indicated that he thought that this would lead to the demise of IEDs. An amendment was introduced by George Cole, Clatsop-Tillamook Counties, whereby IEDs would have a tax base based upon their budget when the law goes into effect. The amendment passed unanimously, 11-0.
- 6. The Superintendent reported on the recent Oregon School Boards Association legislative meeting that he and Chairman Armstrong attended. Legislators Jason Boe, Dick Eymann, Larry Perry, and Ed Fadeley went over the kinds of problems facing the legislators with legislation now in the "hopper."

(The Superintendent stated that sufficient signatures had been obtained and the IED Task Force Bill went into the hopper on Friday, February 9. Another OSBA legislative meeting will be held in Salem on February 22. A poll of the Board members indicated that none would be able to attend the February 22 meeting with the Superintendent.

7. Dr. Gene Maiers, University of Oregon, presented some background information relative to the proposed National Science Foundation Project presently being considered by the IED.

The basic objectives of the program would be (1) to promote a laboratory approach to math instruction; (2) to provide in-service education to elementary teachers in this approach; (3) to perform demonstrations in the classroom with the teachers; (4) to establish a Resource Center available to teachers and IED staff; (5) to establish a mobile laboratory; and (6) to fund an elementary math consultant who would be a resource person in methodology.

(ORS 330.090 2) In the manner provided in ORS 330.090 to 330.107, the district boundary board on its own motion or on petition of three persons residing or owning or occupying real property within territory embraced within a proposed merger or boundary change may merge smaller districts into larger districts or alter the boundaries of common or union high school districts, if it finds that the proposed change:

(a) Will have no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the districts affected to provide the educational program required by law.

(Directors Briggs and Berg stated that they could see no adverse effect on either Pleasant Hill or Springfield in providing the required educational program; therefore, subsection (a) is not a factor in consideration of a boundary change.)

ORS

(b) Will result in improvement of the educational facilities available to the children in the area affected by the proposed change or will result in substantial operating economies in the districts affected.

Board Response

Director Benjamin stated that, after study of information from both districts outlining teacher-pupil ratio, transporation factors, etc., she would find it difficult to justify that the Boundary Board would be improving the educational program by transferring students. Director Bird agreed that the teacher-pupil ratio was practically even but felt that the preponderance of the families involved favor the transfer and the board should consider the change with some favor.

Chairman Armstrong felt no justification in basing decision on number of families alone but that consideration must be given to children who are presently successfully involved in Springfield district activities being uprooted and transferred to another district. Director Briggs stated he was most hesitant to make a decision involving evaluation of the two districts one way or the other. It was the general consensus of the

Board that there would be no substantial improvement of educational facilities or any substantial operating economy by transferring the property from District #19 to District #1.

An informal meeting of the Lane County Board of Education for the Intermediate Education District with the Boards of Westfir School District No. 117 and Oakridge School District No. 76 was held in the McNutt Room at City Hall with the following members present: Chairman Joyce Benjamin, Laura Johnson, Vera Hansen, Milton Turay, Noble Wheeler, Alden Briggs, Dave Burwell, and Secretary William Jones. Also present were Ruth Gould of the IED office; Ray Swanson, State Board of Education; Paul Ehinger, Chairman of the Citizens Committee; Paul Elliott, former IED Board member; and three reporters from the Eugene Register-Guard.

Members of the Oakridge delegation included: Superintendent Carl Rhoda; Keith Leavitt, Board Chairman; Bert Davis, Mrs. Betty Brown, Melvin Willey, Harry Clark, and Mrs. Irene McFetridge, clerk.

Members of the Westfir group included: Alfred Johnson, Superintendent and High School Principal; Verne Laswell, Grade School Principal; Dean Lowman, Chairman of the Board; Fred Luke, Loren Himmel, E. J. Hanson, and Phillip A. Thomas.

Chairman Benjamin called the meeting to order at 8 p.m. At the Chairman's request, Paul Ehinger, Chairman of the Citizens Committee, reviewed briefly the formation and findings of the committee.

Ray Swanson talked on reorganization in general. He cited the opportunity to provide better education as a chief reason for consolidation of districts.

When questioned, Mr. Swanson answered that he "favored the merger method of consolidation with a declaration of an administrative district to follow immediately.

Superintendent Jones reviewed the two methods of consolidation -- merger and reorganization. A discussion on these two methods followed.

Keith Leavitt, speaking for the Oakridge Board, spoke in favor of the merger method. He read the resolutions of the Oakridge Board as adopted October 8, 1965.

The Oakridge Board went on record as favoring: (1) consolidation by merger between Oakridge District No. 76 and Westfir District No. 117, (2) five-man board and no zones, (3) equitable representation in future boards and budget committees, (4) resignation of an Oakridge Board member and appointment of a Westfir Board member when the consolidation took place, and (5) appointment of Carl Rhoda as Superintendent, Al Johnson as Assistant Superintendent, and retain all present personnel.

12/6/68

More discussion followed on the two ways of consolidation.

Chairman Benjamin opened the discussion to the several patrons present.

Mr. John Snyder (Oakridge) asked three questions of Superintendent Jones:

- (1) Does Superintendent Jones favor the joining of the two districts? Dr. Jones replied, "Yes."
- (2) Does Superintendent Jones favor the joining by merger or by consolidation? Dr. Jones, "by the merger route."
- (3) Is this in the best interest of everyone? He said that he thought it would be, certainly, with the assurance of the Oakridge Board that Westfir would be represented on the merger board from the beginning and that he hoped there would be no objection from the patrons of the Westfir community. He further stated that because of the lateness in getting started now, that Oakridge and Westfir would operate as separate districts for 1966-67 but pending a successful merger vote in both communities an administrative district could be formed at the time of consolidation and by including zoning in the plan there could be no doubt as to Westfir representation on the new board.

In summation, Chairman Benjamin restated what seemed to be the concensus of the discussion:

In order to provide the best educational program for all the children in both districts, it will be necessary to: + 1 × 1 1 1

- a. unify the districts.
- b. preserve the administrative continuity.

- c. assure representation to Westfir and Oakridge.

Chairman Benjamin asked Dr. Jones for a summary statement. He stated that the combined boards could design a consolidation plan which would be agreeable to all the board members concerned but it would then be necessary for the Oakridge and Westfir boards to provide the leadership in presenting the ideas to the patrons of both districts. 

A part of a school district may petition the Boundary Board, (or the Boundary Board on its own action), or Boards if involving two counties, for a boundary change moving territory from one school district to another school district. If this is acted on favorably by the Boundary Board the change becomes effective on the following June 30th. It is possible for a remonstrance to be filed to the Boundary Board action through a petition signed by 5 percent

or 500 persons, whichever is the less, of the legal voters in a school district. The matter is then put to a vote of the people in the district from which the remonstrance was submitted. Boundary changes do not necessarily free the area changed from future liability of bonded debt.

O.R.S., Chapter 330, Section 13 Outlines Some Criteria to be Followed in Deciding Boundary Changes.

The district Boundary Board on its own motion or on petition of three persons residing or owning or occupying real property within territory embraced within a proposed merger or consolidation, annexation or boundary change may alter the boundaries of districts, annex territory to districts or merge or consolidate smaller districts into larger districts in the manner hereinafter provided if it finds the following:

- 1. The proposed change will have no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the districts affected to provide the educational program required by law.
- 2. The proposed change will result in improvement of the educational facilities available to the children in the area affected by the proposed change, or will result in substantial operating economies in the districts affected.
- 3. The proposed change is not made solely for tax advantages to the property owners in the district or area affected by the proposed change.
- 4. The proposed change is not likely to adversely affect any contemplated reorganization plans under the provisions of ORS 330.505 to 330.595 and 330.610 to 330.780.



- 3. Superintendent Jones read:
 - a. A letter from Attorney Brownhill in which he advised the boundary board that the 100% clause had been repealed by Chapter 621, Oregon Laws 1965, and the emergency clause had been attached (effective date June 3, 1965.) Also, that Chapter 621 adds a section which requires that the boundary board shall complete all action on a petition for a boundary change within 100 days of the date of the receipt of the petition.

- b. A letter from Frank Lariza, Principal of Junction City High School commending the Data Processing Center.
- 4. Boundary Board matters discussed
- 4. Superintendent Jones reported that the necessary letters and material concerning the Bush and Bilderback petitions had been sent by registered mail to the Boards of Linn and Benton Counties following the Action of the Lane Intermediate Education District Board at the July 15th Hearing.
- 5. Eugene District No. 4 declared Administrative District
- 5. Superintendent Jones read a letter dated February 26, 1965 from Lloyd Millhollen, Deputy Superintendent of District No. 4, requesting the Intermediate Education District Board to postpone the declaring of District No. 4 an Administrative District until after the Bethel-Eugene Merger Hearing.

Following discussion, Director Hansen moved that Eugene District No. 4 be declared an Administrative District and a plan, including numbered positions for board members, be submitted to the State Board of Education. Director Johnson seconded and the motion carried.

- Westfir Oakridge Study Report
- 6. Superintendent Jones presented the Oakridge Westfir Citizens Committee Report on School Consolidation. The report included the following areas which the committee had considered:
 - a. Boundaries consolidated school district to include entire area served by the Oakridge and Westfir school districts.
 - b. Student population no significant change in number of students.
 - c. Existing buildings and projected needs. There is evidently disagreement as to adequacy of existing buildings, but the committee recommends the continued use of all elementary buildings, the present Westfir High School to be used as a two year junior high school for the entire district, and the present Oakridge Junior High School to be used as additional high school classrooms to serve the entire district.
 - d. Transportation could be accomplished with the same number of vehicles now in use.
 - e. Faculty High school students could be accommodated in the expanded Oakridge High School with addition of not more than two teachers (assuming no new courses added.) The junior high school would need all present

combined staff. The elementary schools could be operated with two less teachers.

- f. Personnel all non-certified positions the same.

 Certified personnel approximately 7 or 8 less teachers (this evidently means eliminating duplication in areas of music, art, shop, etc., otherwise it does not agree with their statement concerning faculty requirements.) Administrators adjustment by making one of the present administrators an assistant superintendent.
- g. Adjustment of assets and liabilities all liabilities of each district to be assumed by the new district.
- h. Taxes a substantial reduction in Westfir and an increase of two mills above present Oakridge levy. The kindergarten question came under consideration in this area. The committee estimated that the additional cost of \$20,000 for adding kindergartens in the Oakridge district would be offset by the elimination of two elementary classes.
- i. Method of consolidation as provided by the reorganization laws - they indicated a seven man zoned board.

The committee recommended that:

- a. Consolidation be undertaken as quickly as possible (not later than the fall of 1965) under the reorganization laws;
- b. A seven man zoned board be elected (the committee wants the area zoned to assure Westfir representation on the first board. In a letter addressed to the district boundary board dated July 12, 1965, the Westfir clerk indicated that the joint Boards of Directors of Districts No. 76 Oakridge and District No. 117 Westfir had passed a motion at a meeting held June 7, 1965 in which they recommended a five man zoned board three zones in Oakridge, one in Westfir, and one at large);
- c. The expenses of an election be prorated to the existing districts;
- d. The administrative school district begin functioning as of June 30, 1966 if successful election could be held in the fall of 1965.

Chairman Benjamin commended the committee for the excellent report.

7. Superintendent Jones to prepare plan

7. Director Johnson moved that Superintendent Jones be instructed to prepare a plan of reorganization for the Oakridge and Westfir districts.

Director Wheeler seconded and the motion carried.

The date of the hearing should be early in September.

8. Huston to make written report

8. Sam Huston, Agent of Record, gave a summary report of the Intermediate Education District Insurance program.

At the request of the board, Mr. Huston will present written report with recommendations.

- 9. A motion was made and seconded that the June bills in the amount of \$14,530.10 be approved for payment. The motion carried.
- 10. Financial report
- 10. The financial report was presented and discussed. Superintendent Jones requested the establishment of a petty cash fund in the amount of \$25.

Director Elliott moved that an imprest fund of \$25 be authorized. Director Johnson seconded and the motion carried.

11. Neighborhood Youth Corp and Project Head-Start Reports

11. Robert Lewellyn, Director of the Neighborhood Youth Corp Program gave an interesting and factual summary of the Neighborhood Youth Corp Program.

Mr. Lewellyn stated that 105 girls and 104 boys were participating in the Program with a weekly pay roll of \$3,500 for enrollees and a total pay roll of \$10,000 a week.

Dorothy Leeper, Director of Project Head-Start, reported that approximately 130 children were included in the Lane County Project. Seven (7) teachers, eight (8) paid aides and several volunteer aides have been working with the program. Mrs. Leeper cited some interesting incidents.

- 12. Elementary and Secondary Education Act reviewed
- 12. Mel Mead, Director of the Instructional Materials Center, made use of a film strip and recording prepared by the State Department of Education to present a brief review and summary of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (89-10). The Board discussed several aspects of the program.

- 13. Computer Services 13. Walter Baird, Director of the Data Processing Center, gave a summary report on the Data Processing Center and indicated that he had received requests for services from the Lane Community College and several other agencies.

Director Elliott moved that Mr. Baird be instructed to negotiate with the Lane Community College and the other agencies to

provide Computer Service provided these services do not interfere with Services to Lane County School Districts.

Director Wheeler seconded and the motion carried.

Director Elliott moved that Ruth Stopa and Dorothy Austin be approved as Remedial Reading teachers.

Director Johnson seconded and the motion carried.



- 2. Chairman Benjamin called the meeting to order for the purpose of hearing debate on three petitions requesting boundary changes with the Lanc County Intermediate Education District.
- Chairman Benjamin called upon Secretary Parnell for presentation of the first petition, a request for merger of the Bethel School District No. 52 with Eugene School District No. 4, and other preliminary remarks.

The petition, as presented and signed by 93 citizens, made the following request:

The merging of Lane County District No. 52, Bethel, in its entirety, with Lane County School District No. 4, Eugene, with the sharing of outstanding indebtedness and serial levies -- said merger to become effective June 30, 1966.

Secretary Parnell also used a transparency showing the two districts involved.

Chairman Benjamin asked for testimony from the floor.

Mr. W. E. Clark, patron in the Bethel District, spoke in favor of the petition.

Members of the boards from Bethel District No. 52 and Eugene District No. 4 gave testimony. Superintendent Powers of Bethel spoke; Earl Fullerton testified in behalf of the Bethel Teachers Association; Mrs. Tolson as chairman of the Friends of Bethel District and patrons of the Bethel area all spoke in opposition to the

Following a ten minute recess, Director Benjamin announced that decisions on this hearing would be made following the hearing of all petitions. No further testimony, Chairman Benjamin declared the hearing closed.



4. Bilderback and Bush petitions

4. Chairman Benjamin asked Secretary Parnell to present the petitions and other background material on the two remaining petitions, as both of them were closely related.

Secretary Parnell presented the Bilderback petition, signed by eight citizens, containing the following description of the proposed area:

Beginning at a point on the North line of Section 8, Township 16 South, Range 3 West, Willamette Meridian; South 89° 46' East 2032.18 feet from the Northwest corner of said Section 8, running thence South 89° 46' East along said Section line 1958.05 feet to an iron pin set on the centerline of County Road No. 34, being (60.0 feet in width); thence South 1° 02' East along said centerline 2706.31 feet to the centerline of County Road No. 887, thence North 89° 13' 30" West along said centerline 1962.36 feet; thence North 0° 57' 15" West 2687.68 feet to the place of beginning in Lane County, Oregon.

Secretary Parnell presented the Bush petition, signed by twelve citizens, and containing the following description of the proposed area:

Beginning on the South line of and West 20 chains from the Southeast corner of Section 6, T. 16 S., R. 3 W. of the Will. Mer. in Linn County, Oregon; and running thence North 28 chains; thence East 20 chains; thence North 12 chains; thence East & mile; thence North & mile; thence East & mile; thence North & mile to the Northwest corner of the Northeast Quarter of Section 5; thence East 1.88 miles, more or less, to a point 632.22 feet West of the Southeast corner of the Southwest Quarter of Section 34, T. 15 S. R. 3 W.; thence N. 30° 11' E. 1522.48 feet; thence N. 18° 23' W. 810.03 feet to the North line of the South Half of the Um. Vaughn D.L.C. 50; thence East along said North line 1079.57 feet to the Northeast corner of said South Half; thence S. 13 30' W. along the East line of said Claim 2129.64 feet to the South line of said Section 34; thence East 1.91 miles, more or less, to the Northeast corner of the Northwest Quarter of Section 1, T. 16 S., R. 3 W.; thence South & mile to the Southeast corner of the Northeast Quarter of the Northwest Quarter of said Section 1; thence West & mile; thence South & mile; thence East & mile; thence South & mile to the Southeast corner of the Southwest Quarter of said Section 1; thence West 4.75 miles, more or less, to the place of beginning, and containing approximately 2817 acres.

- 1. Said petition was presented to the District Boundary Board during the fiscal year 1964-65, to wit: On September 8, 1964.
- 2. That said petition was signed by seven (7) people, all of whom are resident taxpayers and qualified voters living in the area under consideration.
- 3. That the affected area is contiguous to School District No. 52, Lane County, Oregon.
- 4. That said petition was directed to the District Boundary Board of the county, to wit: Lane County, wherein the affected area does lie.
- 5. That said petition contains a concise statement of the type of change requested.
- 6. That said petition contains the signatures and resident addresses of the petitioners and the names of the school districts in which they reside.
- 7. That said petition contains a legal description of the territory to be annexed and the school districts affected thereby.
- 8. That the District Boundary Board caused notice of the proposed change and the sessions of the Board when the same would be considered to be published in at least two issues of a newspaper, to wit: Eugene Register Guard, having circulation in the school districts affected.
- 9. The first publication was not more than 25 days, nor less than 15 days preceding said session of the Board, and the second publication was not more than 14 days, nor less than 8 days preceding such session of the Board.

Order Granting Petition - 1

- 10. The proposed change will result in the educational facilities being closer to the children in the affected area.
- 11. The proposed change is not made solely for tax advantages to the property owners in the affected area.
- 12. The proposed change is not likely to have an adverse effect upon any contemplated reorganization under the provisions of ORS 330.505 to 330.595, and 330.610 to 330.780.
- 13. The proposed change will have no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the districts affected to provide the educational program required by law.
- 14. Subsequent to the hearing above mentioned as a result of which the above facts were found and within 20 days thereof no remonstrance was filed by more than 5% of the legal votes in School District No. 4 or School District No. 52, Lane County, Oregon.





Legal Methods of Changing School District Boundaries

1/ Consolidation

Eugene, Oregon

Two or more school districts may call for a consolidation election by a petition (to the Boundary Board) of the registered voters within each district voting. If the majority of the voters at the election vote favorably, the districts are considered consolidated effective at once or the first of July following. Under consolidation, the board of the most populous district is in charge until the next annual election at which time members of this board that have served their full term may be replaced or re-elected. According to the petition and ballot title the districts may pool their assets and liabilities or pool only their assets.

2/ Reorganization

An area desiring to reorganize presents a plan to the Boundary Board (or the Boundary Board by its own action may initiate a plan)(or Boards if two counties are involved.) The plan describes the territory, indicates the number of board members and whether they come from zones or elected at large, may indicate transportation problems and use of buildings. Assets and liabilities may be pooled or assets alone pooled. The vote is by elementary districts. If a favorable vote is received in all districts the reorganization is declared effective next July 1 if the vote is before May, or a year from July 1 if the vote is in May or June. If a part of the area votes against reorganization the remaining area may be reorganized without them.

3/ Extending the Union High School

A union high school must include grades 9_p 10, 11_p and 12. By a vote of the elementary districts involved the union high school may be extended downard any number of grades. If it is extended down to include grade 1, the elementary districts are dissolved and the union high school board is in control until the next annual election. In union high school voting the bellots are counted by elementary districts. A favorable vote must include a majority of the elementary districts plus a total majority vote.

4/ Consolidation of Union High Schools

Two or more union high school districts may vote to consolidate without effecting the elementary districts involved.

5/ Unification

An elementary district may vote to consolidate with a unified district. If this vote is favorable the elementary district may then withdraw from the Union High School to which it belongs to thus avoiding a double union high school tax.



6/ Boundary Change

A part of a district may petition the Boundary Board, (or the Boundary Board on it's own action) (or Boards if involving two counties) for a boundary change moving them from one school district to another school district. If this is acted on favorably by the Boundary Board the change becomes effective on June 30th. It is possible for a remenstrance to be filed to the Boundary Board action through a petition signed by 5 percent or 500 persons, whichever is the less, of the legal voters in a school district. The matter is then put to a vote of the people in the district from which the remenstrance was submitted. This does not necessarily free the area changed from future liability of bonded debt.

7/ O.R.S., Chapter 330, Section 13 Outlines Some Criteria to be Following in Deciding Boundary Changes

- (a) The district boundary board on its own motion or on petition of three persons residing or owning or occupying real property within territory embraced within a proposed merger or consolidation, annexation or boundary change may alter the boundaries of districts, annex territory to districts or merge or consolidate smaller districts into larger districts in the manner hereinafter provided if it finds:
- (1) The proposed change will have no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the districts affected to provide the educational program required by law.
- (2) The proposed change will result in improvement of the educational facilities available to the wildren in the area affected by the proposed change or will result in substantial operating economies in the districts affected.
- (3) The proposed change is not made solely for tax advantages to the property owners in the district or area affected by the proposed change.
- (4) The proposed change is not likely to adversely affect any contemplated reorganization under the provisions of ORS 330.505 to 330.595 and 330.610 to 330.780.



The Bethel School Board, at a meeting held October 28, adopted the enclosed policy on Boundary Transfer Requests.

Because the Bethel School Board feels the pending request for boundary change presented by Dr. Mylon Buck meets the requirements of this policy, it requests the Lane County Intermediate Board to approve the petition and allow the boundary change.

The reasons the Bethel School Board of District Number 52 took this stand are as follows:

- 1. The petition complies with the provisions of the Oregon Revised Statutes.
- The petition also indicates the wishes of the residents of the area involved.
- 3. Boundary change is in agreement with the recommendations made by the Report of the University of Oregon Bureau of Educational Research, frequently referred to as The Goldhammer Report.
- 4. The assessed valuation per pupil is less than the average for either of the school districts involved; consequently School District Number 4 will not suffer financial loss nor will the Bethel School District make a financial gain.
- 5. The matter was discussed with the Eugene School Board Number 4 at a joint meeting held October 21.
- 6. We do not feel that it would be possible to make a full-scale change of the entire area in the section known as Area G in the Goldhammer Report.

SWANSON: The meeting will please come to order. The purpose of this meeting is to hear testimony for and against the proposition to transfer the area of the Marcola District 79 to Springfield District 19 as listed in petition. We have some fairly simple rules of procedure which we will follow. Witnesses who testify will be requested to take an oath. We will ask them to give their name and address, the district from which they come. One person will speak at a time, and we request that they use the rostrum because we are taping the proceedings. However, if they do not wish to use the rostrum, the secretary will take notes. At this time, I would like to ask the secretary of the Boundary Board to explain the petition and give us a short explanation of the law. Mr. Parnell...

PARNELL: Mr. Chairman: The Boundary Board operates under a new law which was passed this legislature, Oregon Revised Statutes, Chapter 330, Section 13. (Then followed a reading of the law.) This is the law under which this Board operates. We have a petition here today for the Board; the names on the petition have been checked with the Department of Records and Election and have been certified. We have other items to be called to your attention here today. The first item is a letter from Mrs. Irene Walters, Clerk of School District 79 stating that the Marcola Board is taking no position on this change as a Board, but will express themselves as individual members. We also have a petition to the Lane County District Boundary Board dated August 6, 1963, signed with 87 names and requesting that this petition be denied. We also have memorandums which were discussed at a previous board meeting in a memorandum from our board attorney, Mr. Brownhill, having to do with various possibilities of the boundary change of the new law; we have a letter from Mr. Commons, Superintendent of School District 19, drawing attention to the fact the Springfield Board would take no stand in this matter and further that they are asking the Boundary Board to delay its decision until after September 23, at which time they are holding a bond election. We also have a letter from Mr. Turnbull,

Deputy Superintendent of the State Department. We discussed his letter at a prior meeting and he lists the various possibilities also.

The notice of this meeting today was posted in both districts as per the legal requirement; the publication of the notice of the meeting and change request was published in the Springfield News at two different times as per the legal requirement also. The Boundary change itself looks something like this: (Mr. Parnell then went to the map which was flashed on the wall by means of an overhead projector and proceeded to point out the boundary change which was the issue at hand.)

SWANSON: Thank you, Mr. Parnell. I might mention that the delay of the decision has been requested by the Springfield District. We have not yet had any indication from the Marcola Board. The hearing will be held open after testimony is made today for a period of time in order that other evidence may be included in the record for the board to study. Now I think we're ready to move on with the hearing. I think we'll call first on the witness for the proponents.

HARMS: I'm Ed Harms, attorney for the resident taxpayers and voters seeking the change in favor of the proposed petition. I must say, Mr. Chairman, and members of the Board, that it is unusual for an attorney to be sworn, and, of course, the information that I'll give to you is based upon the best of my information and belief obtained from the property owners. These resident taxpayers and voters are present, and if the Boundary Board has specific questions of them, perhaps these questions, if I cannot answer them, may better be directed to the individual property owners. We have a number of those people who are interested particularly in this matter who are with us here today. As I said I represent the 28 taxpayers who are, as your secretary has said, 100 per cent of the resident taxpayers and 100 per cent of the qualified voters of the land which is sought to be transferred from District 79 to District 19. The position of these petitioners is that under the present statute as changed by the legislature this year, the Boundary Board has no choice provided that those things found in Section 10 which your secretary has read to you can be found by the Board. This section, again reading it to you so that we might examine whether or not these requirements are met one by one. It says "The Boundary Board shall order the change where you have 100 per cent of the resident taxpayers and 100 per cent of the qualified voters. The change to be made, effective at the end of the fiscal year, provided the property is contiguous and the requirements of Sub-Section 1 are met."

Now, let's take a look again at these requirements of Sub-Section 1. The first of these, of course, is that there be no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the district to provide an educational program. Now, I emphasize the word <u>substantial</u> because your Board will take notice of the fact that the petition adverse to the change simply says that the change will adversely affect the district. And, this, of course, is not the test of the statute. The test of the statute

is and the word of the statute is that the proposed change will have no substantial adverse effect on the ability of the district affected to provide the educational program required by law. The facts are, as they have already been stated, and which we wish to emphasize to you here today, is that the valuation that is concerned is only about \$38,000 or something less than three per cent, about 2.8 per cent of the total value of the district. We believe this clearly demonstrates that taking this property from School District 79, transferring it to School District 19, would be what lawyers like to call diminious, it would have a very small effect and could by no stretch of the imagination be considered to have a substantial adverse effect upon either of the districts. As a matter of fact, in the previous meetings we had, when the time for this hearing was to be set, the evidence seemed to indicate that there were about 20 to 22 students affected by this change who would go to Springfield and that the loss of income at 65 mills would represent on this assessed valuation something under \$2500. It seemed to indicate that Marcola School District 79 loses money by having these children since the per-pupil cost of education in the Marcola District, according to the discussions at the previous meetings that we had on setting this date today, costs considerably more than the per-student income from the taxation involved; so I think we can say pretty clearly that there would be no substantial adverse effect.

You have also before you the information consisting of the personal opinions as reported by the clerk of the Marcola District 79 Board, in the effect amounting to a three to two vote that in their considered opinion the effect would not be substantial. I think that the Chairman, Mr. Wilt, said that there would be some effect but he doubted if it would be substantial enough to cause him to be against having the proposed change carried out.

Now the second one of these requirements is that it result in an improvement of the educational facilities available to the children in the area affected by the proposed change or will result in substantial operating economies in the districts affected, and this, of course, is an alternative clause, it doesn't require vote. We do not believe that this Board could seriously consider that in view of the facilities program and curricula available, particularly at the high school level, that the educational facilities available to these children would not be improved by the transfer to Springfield School District 19. Certainly, this is the considered judgment of the parents and with regard to fact finding on this, we will leave this to the members of the Board.

The third requirement is that the proposed change not be made solely for tax advantages. The facts are quite clear in this case that there is little or no change. Last year the taxes in Springfield were slightly higher than they were in the Marcola District. I think the exact figure for 1962-63 year was 65.3 mills for Springfield as against 65 mills even for District 79 of Marcola. Obviously, the property owners who seek this change are not doing it for a tax advantage. This year we understand the millage rates will be much less in Marcola than

in Springfield. Further evidence that this is the indication is the fact that the parents are primarily interested in educational opportunity that, would be brought about by this change for their children, is the fact that some of these property owners will have property remaining in the Marcola School District upon which they will continue to pay taxes. The fact is they want their children to attend in the Springfield School District and this would also tend to indicate that the change is not being sought for tax advantages.

The fourth requirement, of course, is that the proposed change is not likely to adversely affect any contemplated reorganization. speculative to some extent. These petitioners do not believe that it is likely to adversely affect reorganization considering the past results of consolidation attempt. This is only 28 voters and fortunately or unfortunately, depending upon your point of view, the votes in the past concerning reorganization in the district have not been that close. We wish the Board to seriously consider the effect on the children if they are held in the district after the past history in the district concerning consolidation and with this requested boundary change. has unfortunately become in the district an intensely personal matter; some of these parents feel that it is in fact making it difficult for their children to have equal educational opportunities in the school. The petitioners in this case have tried all they could for reorganization; they felt this was the best solution. This was not acceptable to the electorate in the area, and we would request that this Board act upon this petition with dispatch so that if possible, the children might attend School District 19 this year. We feel that this matter, of effect on the children, is most important. We feel that the effect is twofold: first the effect upon these children personally because of the unfortunate animosities and recriminations that have taken place in the community because of this and, secondly, I think those of you who have had school children or had them change from school to school, whatever the reason, recognize this business of changing is difficult enough and we certainly think that it should be done this school year if at all possible. With regard to the educational benefits to be derived by these children, we would point to the somewhat more extended curricula in the Springfield Schools, a larger variety of programs, the opportunity of competing with other students and the quality of instruc-And we would like to again say, as we did at the previous hearing, this is not a statement that the quality of instruction in the Marcola District, particularly as far as the teachers are concerned, is not adequate. But they are sometimes required to teach, because of a limited number of instructors, in subjects which they are perhaps less experienced than they would like to be. We recognize, these taxpayers recognize, that they will continue to pay a tax in Marcola this year and they may, if a bond issue is voted in the future, continue to be liable for some portion of the levy, as your attorney advised you at previous meetings, to pay off the bonds if there should be any default in these things. We believe that the overwhelming consideration in this case is the children. This year is extremely important to them. We do not believe that there would be any adverse effect on any

Springfield bond issue although, of course, we recognize that this is a matter of opinion. We would, therefore, request that you act promptly. We feel that the proof is more than adequate that these requirements may be found by the Boundary Board as to the things that must appear to your satisfaction; whereupon if the 100 per cent rule applies, we understand it is mandatory that this Boundary Board take this action.

With regard to attending the Springfield School District, there has been no definite decision made; some preliminary discussions have taken place, and I believe that I correctly state the impressions at least that were received by the parties that the matter may be worked out without difficulty to the Springfield School District if this change should take place, while making it clear at the same time that they are taking no position as to whether or not the boundary change should take place. I would be happy to try to answer any questions which you might have if I can, or perhaps the property owners directly affected can answer them if I cannot. Thank you very much for your attention.

SWANSON: Any questions? Mr. Elliott. . .

ELLIOTT: Does this property include all the property that these petitioners own in the district?

HARMS: It does not.

ELLIOTT: Is there some reason for that?

HARMS: I'd have to refer that question to Mr. Eymann.

EYMANN: (He goes on to explain that he had 106 acres and is leaving 30 to 33 acres in the Marcola District because the railroad runs through that part.) Mr. Elliott than asked Mr. Eymann to show them on the map. Mr. Eymann did so, outlining his property, the amount of his property that would be included in the boundary change if it went into effect, and the amount which would be left in the Marcola District.

SWANSON: Yes, I have another question: If there are 22 youngsters leaving the district, how much state and county money will be lost to the district as a result of that?

HARMS: I'm afraid that perhaps your Superintendent is better qualified to answer that than I.

PARNELL: They would lose about \$134 a child from the rural beginning next year. They continue to get basic school support money throughout this year and would not lose that money until next year. They would receive the basic support money even though the children are not there. We'll know after October 15 the amount of basic. Actually they will receive this money this year even though they were not educating the children this year.

ELLIOTT: I believe they receive about \$200 per child in Marcola.

HARMS: Mr. Chairman, I don't wish to interrupt Mr. Elliott but only to make this point that I believe, and those of you who are here can correct me if I'm wrong because this is based upon an imperfect recollection, that the testimony was from someone in the school district that the cost of instruction was about \$600 per pupil. Was this correct?

PARNELL: For the Marcola School District?

HARMS: Yes.

PARNELL: I think that would be about average cost for grades one through 12 per pupil.

HARMS: Yes, and even with the loss of basic school support money plus the loss of tax revenue, it would still represent less per student than the cost of instruction. This was my point. The amount of property tax revenue involved would probably be, as you have pointed out, about half the actual loss of revenue.

SWANSON: Any more questions? Mr. Elliott. . .

ELLIOTT: One more. Do you believe that tutoring is better instruction than in large groups?

HARMS: Well, I'm a lawyer and not an educator except a part-time educator, and I think there are advantages and disadvantages to tutoring. Of course, this would be something that we would find most difficult to achieve in a system of public education in any event, and it would be my estimate based upon observation and conversation with educators that the ideal solution would be something in between. With sufficient students to give competition, an opportunity to compete and compare yourself with other students, together with a broad curricula and small enough classes with teachers experienced in those subjects to reach every student individually.

SWANSON: Any further questions? If there are no more, thank you very much, Mr. Harms. Now, I think we should have the spokesman for the opponent side. Anyone here?

BARTLE: I am William W. Bartle. I have been an attorney in and around Eugene since 1932 and a very short time ago some members of the Marcola school district consulted me and asked me if I would appear today in view of the fact that they understood that Mr. Harms was going to appear for the proponents. As you will note in the file, there are many, many opponents from the Marcola area to this proposition. They have what I consider good reason to oppose this proposition; and in addition from my understanding of the map when it was presented to me, there are many of these areas that will be isolated and they are not contiguous to Springfield School District and also there would be considerable timber land, and land owned by corporations who are not voters, that are property owners, but are not voters. And some of this land would

isolate some of the people who have petitioned. As I understand it, as far as Mr. Eymann is concerned, and his next door neighbor, if they are contiguous to the Springfield School District, there would be no particular opposition to their withdrawing and the boundary including them in the Springfield School District. However, the people opposing this believe that it would be a great financial burden to the district if all the area included in the map shown there were withdrawn and transferred to the Springfield School District. Now, I may be in error but as I understood in the map that I have seen that there were corporations that owned timber land in between some of the people who have signed the petition to withdraw and by the definition as I understand it, if the property is contiguous, the Board can go ahead and then make a new boundary from the findings that you find in view of the fact that you find certain items in here that Mr. Harms went through and there be no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the district to provide the educational program required by law. people opposing this feel that there would be a substantial adverse effect, and that it would result in the substantial operating economies of the district. They don't say that this is solely for tax advantage because the millage in Springfield would be in excess of the millage of Marcola and I believe, from reading newspaper clippings, and if the Springfield school superintendent were here he could testify that the new buildings are needed in Springfield including a junior high school presently constructed, enlargement of present facilities, the building of three new grade schools and the possibility of a new high school before 1967. I am wondering where the money is going to come from.

Now, in regard to this matter of being contiguous, there are some legal definitions in the State of Oregon and in order to define contiguous. . . (Mr. Bartle cites here for several minutes the definition of contiguous from several volumes. He interprets contiguous to mean that each person's property must be contiguous and not the entire parcel requested to be changed, therefore many of the parcels on the northern part of this change are not contiguous.) I would like to call on several persons from the district who have signed as objecting to this boundary change. I would like to call on Mrs. Paschelke. . . Have you made an investigation of what effect this withdrawal of these students would have on the state and other agencies?

PASCHELKE: I have checked the records of the clerk of School District 79.

The figures that her records showed gave this difference in addition to the loss of the assessed valuation of the land. Now, in basic school support as affected by this withdrawal, we would lose \$3,289.00; in taxes, the loss, based upon current figures, would be \$1,938.00. In the county school fund, we would lose \$612.26 and in the rural fund, we would lose \$2,827.02; in the common school fund, it would be \$208.38 which would total \$8,874.66 which would come to approximately 5 3/4 mills in taxation at our present rate. Now, our taxation rate at the present time for our school district is 11 mills, I believe, under Springfield for this next year. We have felt, those of us who are opposing this withdrawal, that in the light of the fact that we have a good school

up there, our students appear able, from current records to have been able to keep up to date, to go to a good school of their choice and make a good record if they so choose. We think they can go out into the world and make an excellent record if that is what they want to do, and that there is no particular reason to say that our school is sub-standard and we have records that we can present to show this. We have an excellent faculty with good training and the records will show this, too. The fact that we are contemplating a building program, we feel that in the light of this new regulation, as it has been publicly stated by a local official, that this withdrawal could possibly be only the beginning of a series of withdrawals, that, as it was stated, it could lead to the gradual disintegration of our district. And as we are looking forward to building, we feel we cannot afford this. That the program we are planning to undertake, if possible, that we will be well able to undertake it without any proven chance of excessive taxation. been at least three or four times in the past when predictions have been made that we would have an excessive tax rate facing us in the near future. No single time has there ever been actual happenstance of that occurring. So we feel there is just as much chance that our taxes are not going up if we build in the light of the taxes that will be coming into the district. There is heavy logging going on now, and true they will reduce our valuation, but it will also bring severance taxes that will help offset this. We are expecting severance taxes to help lower the taxes on our regular school operating fund enough so that we will be able to comfortably be able to pay off our bond issue in the future. So for that reason we object, that if one group goes out without a well-proven reason for it, and surely if they are going out at the bottom of the school ladder down in the early grades where it has been stated time after time that we have a good grade school -- there has been no objection made to it at anytime -- that surely they are jumping the gun so to speak in going out for a good education. That unless we were very suddenly under the standards, we feel they have no particular right to go, especially since they moved into the district knowing it was a small district and we feel we need to keep our district intact if we are to build and maintain another high school.

BARTLE: Did you, through the clerk's office, examine the boundaries and more or less make a map of the owners' property included in the area?

PASCHELKE: A rough map, yes. I did not have access to the exact figures.

BARTLE: If the machine were turned on, could you step to the map and with your map to refresh your memory, point out to the members of the Board where the different property owners are that have petitioned and where the owners of the timberland might be?

PASCHELKE: Yes, I belive I could (she then goes to the map and points out this information).

BARTLE: Does the Willamette Valley Company own property there in that area?

PASCHELKE: Yes (she points the property of that company out on the map).

BARTLE: Were you placed on a committee last year in regard to the study of the schools?

PASCHELKE: I was.

BARTLE: What committee was that?

PASCHELKE: I was placed on the curriculum sub-committee of a larger committee studying school district reorganization.

BARTLE: Would you be in a position to testify as to what the curriculum of the two schools would be in comparison?

PASCHELKE: I don't believe I have the records here today. You have other witnesses who are more qualified, but we felt that Springfield schools are a fine school system for those pupils who reside in the Springfield area. But we feel that we have an excellent small school system at Marcola. In fact, state officials have said that it is unusual for its size. And we feel that our youngsters would lose more than they would possibly gain by going down and if they couldn't gain quite abit by going to Springfield over what they are now getting, which is certainly a good basic curriculum, they would lose more than they would gain by going. And so we felt that was the basis of our being negative to reorganization because we know . . .(interruption).

<u>BARTLE:</u> Do you feel the change would have a substantial adverse effect on the ability of the district to provide an adequate educational program as provided by law?

PASCHELKE: I do because I feel that we would not be able to count on our district. In the light of this new law where it says that these withdrawals can be made as long as they are contiguous that we could not possibly be able to count upon a continuing district. I am one who firmly believes that children should be educated in the area where they live if at all possible. And I see nothing in our millage experience to indicate that it is not possible.

BARTLE: Is there anything that I have not asked you that you feel would have an important bearing from any facts that you have studied and given that you would care to tell the Board?

PASCHELKE: I can't remember that I had anything personally that some of the others could not tell better.

SWANSON: Does the Board have any questions?

ELLIOTT: What millage for schools do you feel Marcola District would be willing to pay in order to keep the present schools and add a new building?

PASCHELKE: The millage that I feel we will be asked to pay will be not too much out of line with what we have been paying because it has been brought out time after time there's timber being cut in our area; some of that timber comes under one type of severance tax and some under another. There is heavy logging going on now which is, true enough, reducing our valuation but it is bringing in larger severance taxes than we have gotten in the past and we feel that will be equalizing the load so there is no particular reason to anticipate a heavy millage. What I have figured on what I think will be the amount spent, I feel that there won't be more than an increase of 15 mills for our bond issue because we have dropped our millage. The only thing that would adversely affect it that we could not count on right now would be this referendum on the tax system. But that would hurt all the other districts too so we all would be in the same boat together.

ELLIOTT: I believe your millage for this coming year is 51 mills. Did you know that if the Rural School Board fiscal budget had failed to exceed the 6% limitation that your millage up there would be 61 mills for this year?

PASCHELKE: We all voted for the Rural budget, and we felt that we did everything we could for that but that is something that we all have to take into account. What I'm going by is the past experience of the district in the light of the fact that there have been at least three different times that we have been threatened with heavy millage increase but there are different things that offset that as our district grows and it is growing by leaps and bounds. We will be getting more state aid and there is no official up at the state office that has told us that they will withhold that from us. And as we get more severance taxes, I feel that we have every reason to anticipate life more or less as usual. Personally, my husband and I feel that we pay heavy taxes but we are willing to pay proportionately larger taxes for a good education because as generations go by, everything is going up in price. And I feel that a good education is worth paying an increased price for, too.

ELLIOTT: Of course, there are a number of districts in this county who pay more taxes than you are paying and they are contributing to the county equalization fund exceeding the 6% limitation.

PASCHELKE: We have contributed up to this year. I think this last year was when we changed to a receiving district.

<u>SWANSON</u>: Any other questions? I have one: What do you consider a substantial adverse effect upon the district in percentage?

PASCHELKE: In percentage? You mean, ultimate? 2.8% -- that's the percent assessed valuation of the transfer property, is it not? Well, 2.8% plus these other figures that I read to you perhaps might not show the whole picture. For instance, as our district is growing people are sub-dividing. Now, there's at least one person withdrawing who now resides in the Marcola water district and there is a great deal of

feeling that a person who lives that close to the center of the district should logically be considered a part of the Marcola School District. If a place is being divided and sold, we might logically expect a great number of people to be coming into the area that would create quite a jump in assessed valuations. But it would be a lot more than it is now.

SWANSON: In terms of percentage, what would you consider substantial?

PASCHELKE: Well, I think that any change right now is substantial, anything going out of the district; because as it was considered lately, we were talking of bonding capacity, well, property owners didn't care to bond to capacity but as long as we are considering getting near that, I think we should say that unless people have a really good reason to go out -- and I think the level of our education is good enough so that they do not have that good a reason. And so far as discrimination is concerned, I have seen nothing of it. People have leaned over backwards to be friendly. And if these people weren't afraid the taxes were going skyhigh in the very near future, perhaps they wouldn't be quite so determined to get out. It doesn't look now that that is the reason, but that is the only one that makes sense to us up there living with them.

SWANSON: Any more questions? Thank you, Mrs. Paschelke.

BARTLE: I'd like to call Mrs. Landreth.

LANDRETH: I'm Mrs. Landreth from the Marcola District.

BARTLE: Where do you reside in the Marcola District?

<u>Eymann</u> property which he is not including into the Springfield District, which he is not having changed. It's along the main highway leading to Marcola. It would have to be on the right hand side of the road as you're going to Marcola. (Mr. Parnell goes to the map and with the help of Mrs. Landreth's directions, points out her property on the map).

PARNELL: Is your property contiguous with the Springfield District?

IANDRETH: Yes. It connects the Springfield District. And I feel that since we live so close to the Marcola District - its much closer to grade school and high school - only two to two and a half miles -- for if the children would travel to the Springfield District to either the Springfield High School or the Thurston High School, it would be 14 miles or more. That is the closest travel time. If you would consider the property line clear up to the county line of the Marcola School District, that is taking considerable more mileage and travel time. I do know the children that do go to school in the Springfield District catch their bus at five after seven in the morning and do not arrive back to the same destination until 25 after four in the afternoon. Figure up how much time they are away from home. I do not feel that my

children would have the proper advantage of sports, and of time at home if they lived that far away and if they had a chance to go to the Springfield District, although there are many things to consider in the schools there. They are good schools and the Springfield Schools have good schools, but I feel that we have the advantage of giving our children the sports and not being on the way that long.

BARTLE: Do you hold an office in the PTA or similar organization?

LANDRETH: No, but I have in the past. I was the president of the P.T.A. at one time.

BARTLE: Did you serve on a committee in regard to a previous boundary reorganization?

LANDRETH: No.

BARTLE: Have you made a study of the matter of curriculum?

LANDRETH: No, I think there is another lady that has that.

BARTLE: Oh. Your property is adjacent to the Springfield School District?

LANDRETH: Yes.

BARTLE: You and others would be isolated if this change were made?

LANDRETH: Yes, and there is another family that is farther down than I am that would be isolated more than we are. That is the name of Donn. They are farther down and have a small piece of property. I don't know how they can be connected to the Marcola area when they are surrounded by the Springfield District as they are. And as I understand it, even up in the Parsons Creek area, there is people that would be surrounded. I can't see that there would be so much confusion. Anybody moving into this area would not know which district that they would be in since there is jogging here and jogging there, especially up Parsons Creek area. There is a lot of building up there. They would wonder where their line would be, what district they would be in and I feel it would be so much better if we can keep our school there and not change the boundary line.

BARTLE: In order to speed the meeting up, I know the Boundary Board is interested in facts. Is there anything I have not asked you in regard to fact that you may have personal knowledge of that you feel would enlighten them?

LANDRETH: No.

SWANSON: Are you aware of the basis for the decision on which this transfer is considered? Principally, the substantial adverse effect?

LANDRETH: Yes, I do. I feel that my children are getting a very well-balanced education there in the high school for they are enjoying it and are getting what they have asked to take, and they are taking what is standard for them.

BARTLE: I'd like to call Mrs. Hobeck.

HOBECK: I'm Mrs. Dean Hobeck, Marcola District.

BARTLE: Would you tell the Board where you reside in the Marcola District?

HOBECK: Yes, I live approximately three miles on the other side of Marcola.

BARTLE: Do you hold an office in the P.T.A.?

HOBECK: I'm current president.

BARTLE: Have you been on a committee or made a study regarding the Marcola School District?

HOBECK: Yes, I'm one of the trouble makers.

BARTLE: What committee have you served on?

I came in new to the area after all these committees had been formed, HOBECK: but I took it upon myself to do a little quality education investigation. Through the Attorney General Thornton, I got an appointment with Dr. Minear whom I'm sure you all know. He gave me the state survey about high schools graduating under 100 students and all through the state, it is found that they do have poor education, and costs more per student. They don't go on to college and they drop out. But Mohawk is an exception. (She gives some sheets from these surveys to the Board for examination) Our teachers are more than well qualified, and I think it should be definitely understood that our teachers are teaching in their fields. Three of our teachers have their Masters and the other three will have theirs at the end of next summer. We hope to keep them because they are well qualified. Here's our curriculum if you would like to see that. (She gives the sheet to the Board). I did a little follow-up on some of our graduates. We have numerous teachers; actually many of them are teaching in the Eugene and Springfield Districts; school superintendents, geologists, one of our teachers won a Fulbright scholarship, one was on a research fellowship; we have at least 2 doctors, retail executives, a judge. I think that is all I have to say.

BARTLE: Do you think this change would have a material adverse effect upon the ability to meet the state qualifications?

HOBECK: I can't help but definitely feel that it would.

BARTLE: You have given the Board your survey and the benefit of your findings in regard to the curriculum. Is there anything else?

HOBECK: I don't think so. Only that I should say at Salem they were under the impression that Marcola was a dying community. It is a small community but we are definitely growing. I thought that was one misrepresentation - that and the quality of our education. So that was what I set out to find out.

SWANSON: Any more questions of the Board? If not, thank you.

BARTLE: One last witness I might call. Mr. Paschelke, who is the chairman of the school board. Correction -- School board member.

MR. PASCHELKE: I'm Leo Paschelke, Marcola board member, District 79. There's one thing in this withdrawal that puzzles me and that is the attitude of what I might class as newcomers to our area - people who have been there just a few years. Surely before making a move into a small school district, they certainly must have investigated very thoroughly the advantages or disadvantages of a small district. And if they did not like a small district, the thing that puzzles me is why they did make that move and now when we do have a building program in the future plus a bigger and better school system, why they want to withdraw from our area and leave a larger burden on the remaining people. I believe this is the sum of what I have to say today.

SWANSON: Do you have any questions of Mr. Paschelke, Mr. Bartle?

BARTLE: No.

SWANSON: Does the Board have any questions?

<u>ELLIOTT</u>: Has anybody every appeared before your board and asked you to increase the number of teachers in the high school or increase the budget to step up the salaries of the teachers?

MR. PASCHELKE: No, I don't recall any at the moment.

ELLIOTT: It would be unusual if they did.

SWANSON: In terms of percentage, what do you consider to be a substantial adverse effect? What would you consider a minimum before it would be substantial? Would 1% be minimum?

MR. PASCHELKE: Very possibly so, yes. In following that up, considerable of this property involved in this withdrawal is potential subdivision property which in the future will no doubt come up in value. That is also one of my reasons for the financial look at this thing.

SWANSON: Are there any other questions? If not, thank you.

BARTLE: May it please the members of the Board. Two ladies appeared at my office from Springfield opposing this matter and whether they have any facts pertinent to their own personal knowledge . . . did you ladies have any facts?

LADY IN AUDIENCE: I don't have any facts but I do have some opinions.

SWANSON: Could we reserve the opinions until after we hear the testimony?

BARTLE: Yes. I do not believe I have any more witnesses.

SWANSON: Do the members of the Board have any questions of Mr. Bartle?

JOHNSON: I would like to clear up what Mr. Bartle was implying about continuity. You were implying, I think that corporation-owned land would prevent continuity of land in two different portions of the district?

That is my impression of the Oregon law. Now, as I understand it, BARTLE: if it is contiguous then it becomes contiguous to the adjacent school district and they define the word contiguous as being adjacent so that then the Board could go ahead and operate on their own. If they find a portion of this is not contiguous, then it would seem to me that it would come under Sub Section 4, of Section 12, of Chapter 282 of the Laws of 1943 which were just enacted which reads: (read law) Our contention is that if there is intervening land of corporations and judging from the people who signed the petition in favor of the change, there were portions that would be isolated and would not be contiguous. Our contention also is that their intervening land, the property up north, would not be contiguous and, therefore, it would be a matter for the election of the people first in Marcola and then in Springfield. Then, of course, if we have to define the word contiguous, then the way we could do it would be to read a review of the circuit This is a new section of the law and it is the first time that it has been presented as far as I know as to the definition of contiguous in this particular matter; and as I say, from the persons who signed the petition, the opponents were of the opinion that there were many of them that were not contiguous. In fact, one school bus would be coming almost through the city of Marcola to take the students to Springfield. But anyway, that is our contention that it is a matter that should be submitted to the Board. I am not in the position to say from the map that was flashed on the board whether there is an intervening property in there but if I understand Mrs. Paschelke that there was some timber land in there owned by Willamette Valley that would separate some of those to the north up Parsons Creek.

SWANSON: Section 10 states that 100% of the qualified voters in the area, qualified voters rather than property owners, would that change the definition of contiguous as you interpret it?

BARTLE: That changes it as I interpret it by having something intervening in there because it is stated in there that even though a person would have a 50 foot strip for half a mile that they were not contiguous just for the purpose of remaining in the school district. In regard to the size of the district, the Attorney General stated (he gives here what the Attorney General said about an area not only connecting and adjoing, but also reasonably compact). And our contention is that it

would be unreasonable to extend it on up that far and through territories that are owned by timber companies. It says 100% of the resident taxpayers and 100% of the qualified voters of an area. So that is a matter that would have to be determined, I don't know. That is our understanding.

SWANSON: Do you say that this petition doesn't include 100% of the resident taxpayers or 100% of the qualified voters?

BARTLE: In that particular area. Our contention is that that would isolate them the same as a stream or a street.

<u>SWANSON:</u> Are there other questions? If not, thank you. I think it might be appropriate since we have heard from the opposing side to hear from the proposing side. Mr. Harms?

I might say that the most advisable course for the district Boundary HARMS: Board is to refer this question to their own attorney rather than relying upon the statements of either the proponents or the opponents in this. But based upon some experience in teaching in the field of municipal corporations at the University of Oregon Law School, the cases which Mr. Bartle cites are those cases referring to what a thin strip of land is developed - this business about it being reasonably compact - these are all cases where you have strip developments - the 50 foot strip of land - for a half mile which he cited. And the definition in the law ordinarily the general rule, is stated by McQuellen X that "Several tracts may be annexed as being contiguous if one tract is contiguous to the municipality and the other tracts are contiguous to each other." This property certainly meets the test. The property on the South and West is contiguous to the School District 19 and all of the other tracts included in this are contiguous to each other. This meets the rule which is the general definition. It is found in $Volume\ 2$ of McQuellen on Municipal Corporations, Section 7.20 of Page 312. Oregon court in the case in relation to petition of the Board of Directors of the Tillamook Public Utility District 160 Oregon at 530 said the territory concluded to be contiguous does not necessarily need to be contiguous itself so long as it is contiguous to other territory that is at some point. The definition of continuity is different than that of being adjacent. Two pieces of property, for example, which came together only at a corner would be considered adjacent but not contiguous. This is not the case here and according to the test if Mr. Bartle's assumption that intervening land where the person is not a resident taxpayer and not a qualified voter would have the effect of reading this completely out of the law. This changes the requirements to 100% of the property owners owning 100% of the property and this is not what the code says. 100% of the resident taxpayers, and if you assume that his definition that if there's any property in there owned by a non-resident, therefore not a resident taxpayer or not a qualified voter, you're making something entirely different out of the statute -you're taking the meaning of these words right out of the statute

and we have to assume in interpreting the language that the legislature makes in any case that they intended that each word have some meaning. And it is obvious in this case that is why the words were inserted "resident taxpayers" because there are many other places in the law such as an annexation on the part of cities where it can be done by 100% consent - where the requirement is 2/3 of the property owners, for example, owning 2/3 of the property. This is the test in this case. The requirement is made that these tests will apply and that the Board shall act if it is 100% of the resident taxpayers with 100% of the qualified voters and this is certainly the case here. Thank you very much.

SWANSON: Mr. Harms has had two chances. Would you like another opportunity to comment, Mr. Bartle? (Mr. Bartle says he has nothing more to add.) Since we have given the opponents several opportunities to speak, are there other proponents who wish to testify?

EYMANN: Mr. Chairman and Members of the Board: This boundary change comes after a long effort over a long period of time to arrive at another solution as far as the people who are involved are concerned to the Marcola School District. I personally felt for some time that reorganization is the proper answer not only for the education of the youngsters, that an equal or better level of educational opportunity will be given the students if the school district is consolidated. Secondly, that reorganization will accomplish a lower combined cost of education compared to the two districts being separated; and finally since both school districts get state support and are supported also or give support, depending upon the situation, from the rest of the county, it is good economy to operate as efficiently as possible. This effort for reorganization has failed. There is another approach that can be taken. We who are involved feel to solve our own problems at our end just as strongly as those who felt that they do not want to be included in a consolidated school district and now we have this opportunity at our end as a minority in the district to solve our problem by ourselves and under the law and become part of School District 19. The comment has been made upon what is substantial adverse effect. The comment was also made that the timber harvest was being taken out but severance taxes would be supplied. My own opinion is that the testimony that has been given is optimistic. But if the testimony is correct, a greater amount of tax value is coming out each half year in timber value being cut and taken out of the district, than what is involved in this boundary This small percentage, less than three per cent, cannot be an adverse effect, if the value (or volume?) of timber being taken out each half year is greater than that, and if there's confidence, that removal of volume will permit the district to continue to operate and build a new school. As to the quality of education and the problems that we have in the Marcola School District at the high school level, I refer you to the report of the State Board of Education on approval, reluctant approval, of these plans for a new high school building in which the Board indicated that they reluctantly approved them but that they did not believe this was a solution to solving the problem, the problem

of providing education at the high school level in Marcola. We will continue as taxpayers in that portion of the school district, to continue to contribute to the Marcola School District through the rural school levy - some of us have property left in the district, and we would be paying income taxes as valuation goes down or as an equalization goes up at the state level, we will continue to pay income taxes which will continue to flow to the Marcola School District. So we will be making our contribution. And one other point must be made very clear that there is not a single resident taxpayer and not a single voter isolated or out on an island from the property that is to be included in School District 19. It is all contiguous property or a portion of the property involved. And no one remaining in Marcola is separated from the rest of the Marcola School District. I urge your prompt action on this. If you do refer it to your attorney to look into this one matter of continuity in your own sessions, I would hope that you can arrive at a decision pending possibly on this one question of what your attorney advises you. But it's important to the school children that if you can arrive at a decision with dispatch, and that this change be accomplished this school year if possible. I am extremely reluctant to mention this next item because I don't pay much attention to it but at our home we had a number of phone calls, threatening phone calls, as to why we are taking the action that we are. The feeling is intense, I think its coming from teenagers rather than adults. I suggest your acting with dispatch on this matter, for the reasons I have cited. Primarily, the level of education in the Springfield School District we think is better or superior especially at the high school level and because of the evident friction which has been developed because of this situation.

SWANSON: Any questions?

ELLIOTT: Mr. Eymann, are there other large taxpayers in Marcola District besides Southern Pacific?

Southern Pacific does not have any ownership at the present time EYMANN: as far as I know in the Marcola District. The land was purchased by Weyerhauser. The railroad, it is now rather than being on a centrally assessed basis, it is not part of the timber holdings and the timber lands. Weyerhauser is the primary holder of value in the district at the present time and if I^{\dagger} m not mistaken they own somewhere between 52 and 60% of the valuation in the district. There are other timber operators but almost all of those lands have been cut over in recent years and so it doesn't represent a substantial amount. Some of it is in forest fee yield of Georgia Pacific property, that's in the Wendling area, and until it reaches a point of harvest which can be anywhere . . . there is very little to be harvested in the next ten years, most of it will be 20 to 30 years away. Currently, it is yielding in revenue at 10 cents an acre. Of course, at the time of harvest, it will be 12½ per cent of the value.

SWANSON: Any questions? I have one. Can you tell me, Mr. Eymann, what subjects your children take at the Springfield School District that are not offered in Marcola?

EYMANN: One of them that I recall this last year was a combination program of Social Economics (this is a senior year course) in cooperation with the Oregon State University. It was an early morning class which made use of the television facilities as well as the teacher who was a specialist in this field. It was a college level course and is not offered at the Marcola School District. In the field of languages, I believe, the only language offered in the Marcola School District is Spanish. Our youngsters have taken German and one of them is planning to take Russian in the Springfield School District. The offerings in the sciences are, I believe, biology and physics if there's a request for it. But Marcola does not offer a chemistry course.

SWANSON: Has this been requested at Marcola?

EYMANN: If it has been requested, you cannot get a chemistry course.

Chemistry is one of them (courses offered in Springfield, not in Marcola), they have taken foreign languages not offered in Marcola School District, they have taken an economics course which is not offered at the Marcola School District and in the field of athletics, wrestling and track. Both my youngsters earned letters in both of them which are not offered in the Marcola District.

SWANSON: Do your children plan to attend the Springfield School District this year whether or not the boundary is changed?

EYMANN: Up beyond the 6th grade - if we can work it out with the Spring-field School District. It is a question of working this out. In one case possibly where if they had taken us in earlier, we would have gotten started earlier on this program beyond the 6th grade. But a larger number now want to go in, and the matter of working a tuition system out compatible and acceptable by the Springfield School District is involved and this becomes extremely difficult if there is no prospect that we will become resident taxpayers in the Springfield School District, and no prospect of qualifying for county equalization and no prospect of qualifying for state support, because it is resident ADM'S, as I understand it, which are important in the distribution. They are resident ADM's, as I understand it, in Marcola when we are there but even though our youngsters are going to Springfield, they are not eligible for basic.

SWANSON: I think probably we should have another proponent if there are any.

BELL: I'm Helen M. Bell, Marcola District. My people have held property in that district since 1903. I'm really an oldtimer. It seems to me that most of the testimony has dealt more or less with consolidation but that really isn't the question under consideration here. This is boundary change. Now, this is a free country, and why can't these

people get out if they want to get out? Who's to say what's good for somebody's children except those people themselves? As far as the difference, adverse effect, that timber is going out in half a year, enough to more than amount to this change. Anybody who watches the log trains go by and the trucks, they go by just by the dozens. They run not only one log train but sometimes two in one day. As far as I'm concerned, I think this petition should be granted. They say, "Well, somebody else might want to go." Well, why do they want to go? It seems to me that . . . if they made the Marcola district attractive enough, people might want to stay. We don't have any children in school but I've lived there a long time and I have that district's interests very much at heart, and I want to say that I'm very much for letting them go if they want to. I don't think their withdrawal will cripple the district. If it would, then the Marcola district is indeed in very deep financial condition.

SWANSON: Do you live in the area that's proposed for transfer?

BELL: No I don't. I'd be delighted to get out if I was contiguous but I'm not!

SWANSON: Would your property be contiguous provided this change was made?

<u>BELL</u>: No. It doesn't make a great deal of difference - we're not heavy property owners. I just have a conscientious objection to some of the things that go on up there. I don't believe in keeping them against their will.

SWANSON: In your opinion there would not be a substantial adverse effect?

BELL: Indeed not, in my opinion. They're in very very poor condition if such a small amount of money would be a substantial adverse blow to them. Now that's my opinion. You understand I'm no expert, I just live there. Thank you.

<u>PARNELL</u>: Mr. Chairman, we have a representative of Weyerhauser here. I wonder if he might have a comment.

WEYERHAUSER REPRESENTATIVE: No comment.

ELLIOTT: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to ask the chairman of the board again the question relative to their plans. There is another district in this county with almost an identical property valuation. They have a new building. They are paying from 90 to 100 mills a year for schools. Would Marcola be willing to pay 90 to 100 mills for a new school up there?

MR. PASCHELKE: Correction: I'm a former chairman. Evidently from all indications of the people, they are willing to put up a new building.

ELLIOTT: Regardless of cost?

MR. PASCHELKE: Naturally, I won't say regardless, there has to be some limitation within reason.

ELLIOTT: Of course, you're limited by bonding ability. This district I 'm speaking of has a building that costs \$375,000. With your present valuation it would probably be about 15 to 20 mills; 15 mills for interest and payment on the bond and another five mills for operation. I bring this up because several people have told me they're not happy about it now - pay off the bonds - and you can't change the horse in the middle of the stream.

MR. PASCHELKE: I believe that when the actual cost is brought up on the building that the millage would be bigger right now than the mills before the bids are actually accepted. That will be up to the people at that time.

SWANSON: Have you discussed the matter with Weyerhauser since they're paying 50 or 60% of the taxes for a new building?

MR. PASCHELKE: Oh, they'd like to put up two new buildings - they figure one isn't enough.

SWANSON: Mrs. Landreth?

LANDRETH: I was wondering about residents down along the river by the name of Dunn - could you show me on the map how they are connected to the district if the property is changed to the Springfield District. (Mr. Eymann goes to the map and shows her)

MR. PASCHELKE: My wife and I did have some conversation with Mr. Kronenberg on the school construction and he did feel that Weyerhauser did have a stake in the school construction because of the increased population due to their activities in the valley. And he thought that it was reasonable enough if the financing did not exceed the reasonable limits. Whether he wanted to be quoted on that, I don't know, but I quoted him.

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SWANSON: Mrs. Hobeck?

<u>HOBECK</u>: If some of these people, that are withdrawing, next year decide to withdraw the rest of their property, they would be above Marcola, further up toward Linn county line. What is to stop them next year from drawing up a petition for another boundary change? Do you understand what I mean?

SWANSON: No, I don't believe so. Would you like to show us on the map?

(She does so and repeats her question. . .)

SEGER: They wouldn't be residents after this property change, they wouldn't be resident property holders of the Marcola District.

HOBECK: I think it would be a very clever move to take up part of the property this year and the rest of it next year and Marcola would be a little island.

PARNELL: The law provides the only way the Boundary Board can operate is where 100% of the resident voters and 100% of the resident property owners sign. This boundary change is considered only for people who live in that area.

DOWNING: Lee Downing, board member from District 79. I would like to just state to Mr. Elliott - he asked Mr. Paschelke if he felt the residents of Marcola were willing to bond to full capacity. I would like to say that there are quite a few people in that area who aren't willing to bond to full capacity. When the plan was first presented by the board to build to capacity, there were several people who objected to this. They did not feel that they could stand full bonding capacity. a group of people submitted a petition asking the board to bond to \$350,000. In my estimation I feel that this isn't as good as the \$450,000 or our full capacity because we have these things that the state has stated we have to do if we stay as a district. And prolonging this building program in that way, by getting something started at \$350,000 we are going to have to go ahead and build to complete eventually and the way our valuation is slipping due to timber, I feel that we are going to be in worse shape in a few years to build this building than we are at the present time. If I had my choice as to vote on one, either \$350,000 or \$450,000 or half a million, I would rather go for the half a million because we are in much better shape It is hard to say or pick on Weyerhauser, but they are going to help us pay it now. If they move this timber, we are not going to have this help. Another thing that could happen if we do go to \$350,000, they could come in and remove this timber faster, and if we have to float this new bond in a few years to build our P.E. plant and so our education facilities there are going to be in worse shape, in my estimation, than they are at the present time. I feel that this group of people who want this school so bad, a good share of them are not paying this load of taxes. I feel if they had to pay some of this load that they would consider this building program a little more thoroughly than they are. I believe we will greatly better ourselves if we could have an education similar to Springfield and I don't see how we can do this just through this building program. We're going to have to broaden our curriculum, I feel, and I don't see how we're going to broaden our curriculum if we are going to spend all our money for a building and with the building program that the board set up, we're going to have very minimum equipment. And to me building a building without proper equipment in it and teachers, what good is a building to the people? You have got to have the students and teachers and equipment in this building. So I don't see how we, a district the size we are, can go ahead and provide an education in this day and age, I just don't see how we can.

HENDRICKSON: As I understand it, this proposed building would not include a gym?

DOWNING: No, they have cut the gym out and that was one of the things that the people in the area have all hollered about - they wanted this gym. At their last budget meeting a year ago, they came to us and they were concerned about the parking in the area and about the seating in the gym we have now. By the time that the two schools get their students in, they fill the seating almost to capacity. And there was quite a concern to the budget board last year to enlarge the seating capacity of the present gym. Under my assumption as a board member when the first building program started that we needed a gym very badly. We actually were going to use both gyms. The new gym was going to be a split gym and they were going to use two areas of it, a division - and we were talking on this new building program of a 6-6 system. With the six grades and the 7th and 8th being added to our school we needed the larger facilities to handle the gym. Now they come up to the board that they don't need the new gym, that we can get along with the old one just fine. It doesn't sound to me like why they needed it so bad in the start and now they don't need it. Mrs. Landreth said sports was one of her main reasons for opposing the withdrawal. Our gym and facilities such as our shower room and things, I can't see where sports in that type of conditions can be a real strong factor.

ELLIOTT: I notice on this program of studies there are seven teachers. In this other school system about your size here in Lane County, they have nine teachers. Have you considered any more teachers? Is the teacher load heavy?

<u>DOWNING</u>: I believe it is, yes. My wife happens to be one of the teachers in that school. The load is real heavy. She's teaching out of her field and I know that the statement was made here today that teachers weren't teaching out of their field. She has her Masters in Business. Last year she had to teach P.E. and this year it's Home Ec. I think they should stay in their own fields; that's where they can do the best job.

ELLIOTT: There is not space enough for more teachers? Is that one of the problems?

<u>DOWNING</u>: We are in need of space and that's one thing for the building program. We have had so many other problems - I know we need more teachers. I feel that the publicity and that there are the people who have been hurt on this building problems - there are other sides.

MRS. SHULTZ: I wonder if Mr. Parnell would point out Parsons Creek Road, how it is affected by the boundary change? Does it run through the boundary change? There are many of us who live above that. Actually we are isolated.

PARNELL: School district boundaries have nothing really to do with other types of municipal boundaries.

SHULTZ: Is this an unusual situation or does it appear in other districts?

PARNELL: No.

SWANSON: Any other comments?

JOHNSON: Mr. Mauney, I was wondering if these two sets of test scores we have seen today are representative of every year? Are these the two best classes in recent years?

MAUNEY: There are records for other years.


HOBECK: That is this year's seniors' tests taken when they were 9th graders.

included in the proposed withdrawol from District 79, is taxed now at 10% per sore per year, and brings in only \$32 into the school district. However, two contractors who are soon to go into operation will be cutting timber that at the time of cutting, has a market value set by the county assessor at \$25.50 per thousand board feet. To simplify my figures here, I used the amount of \$25 and that would figure out to a total value of \$25,000 for a million board feet.

The severance tax on this type of timber is 12.5% of the market value, or \$3125 on each million board feet. There is already one logger at work in the Parson Creek basin and two more are due to go in. With this much Willamette Valley lend involved in the withdrawel and with much of the blowdown still in place, you can begin to see why those who oppose the withdrawel feel that this is too high a price for the district to pay to satisfy the few families involved.

Add to this, the \$38,000 loss in assessed valuation and the corresponding drop in District 79 bonding capacity and the loss in actual yearly school income of \$8,07% (equivelent to 5.75 mills) and I feel sure that you, the members of the Boundary Board can see why there are many people in the district who feel that this plan threatens a very real loss to the school district.

Timber company land (excepting Weyerhaeuser Co.) in Dist. 79, for the most part, does not appear on the tax rolls since it is mainly in reforestation but as the figures above show, the value

is still there and the severance tax is substantial. Georgia-Pacific has three contractors now at work in their reproduction, some of which, in the Wendling area, is as much as 50 years old and crowded to the point of ceasing growth. Our county assessor, Mr. Omlid said last fall that G-P plans to log out everything in the area that is over 12 inches in diameter. This apparently being true, you can begin to understand the basis I had for my estimate, at your hearing, that a building bond i sue for the Marcola School District might reasonably be expected to start at about 15 mills.

part of the Springfield School District and past experience shows that they seem to have some justification for their feelings.

Popular opinion in Marcola does not object to the change for those two families, alone, but we feel that any more than that would create a serious division of property within the district, with a corresponding financial loss that would be uncalled for.



At its October 26, 1964 meeting, the Board of Directors of School District 4 gave further consideration to the proposed transfer of territory from District 4 to 52 and took the action set forth in the following paragraph:

"Mr. Miller moved that School District No. 4 inform the District Boundary Board that concerning transfer of land in Section 19, it approved the transfer to District 52, but that the Board wishes to make certain that this does not imply any intention to transfer other land adjacent to this property to District 52. The motion was seconded by Dr. Stauffer. Dr. Stauffer then moved, and Mr. Sikes seconded, that the preceding motion be amended to read that District 4 approves the transfer of property provided there is 100% acquiescence by persons residing, or owning, or occupying real property in the area affected. The amendment was approved and the motion, as amended, was then approved."

The Board of Directors also approved the following statement of policy to govern the boundary transfer requests in the future. In taking this action, it was understood that District 52 and District 19 would also be giving further consideration to establishing a similar policy.

Director Elliott moved that the hearing be set for Tuesday, October 13, 1964, at 7:30 P.M. in Harris Hall. Director Turay seconded, and the motion carried.

4. Chairman Swanson reported that he had been re-appointed to the Logislative Committee of the State School Boards Association.

Director Elliott reported on his attendance at the Oregon School Superintendents' meeting and called to the attention of the Board, two resolutions:

- from \$245,541,302.00 (1964) to \$264,844,821.00 (1965), an 8% increase. The millage rate for the District dropped from 23.9 (1964) to 22.5 (1965), a one and a half mill drop.
- 7. Superintendent Parnell explained the status of the Data Processing Center by reporting that with the present personnel and installation, the capacity had been reached both in financial reporting and educational applications. Districts are still requesting services in both areas and perhaps the Board might consider establishing a priority system.
- 8. Director Elliott moved that the requests for new Data Processing services be listed for the present time, and that a list be maintained for each type of service. If an opening to supply additional service should occur, the district would be notified. Priorities shall be given to those services which will fit into the existing pattern of applications.

Director Hansen seconded, and the motion carried.

9. Director Hansen moved that the Lane County Board of Education co-sponsor with the Lane County School Boards Association, a series of three "open forum" meetings whereby candidates for the Community College Board would have an opportunity to speak. These 8 P.M. meetings are to be held on September 29 in Mapleton; October 6 in Pleasant Hill; and October 15 at the Eugene Technical-Vocational School in Eugene.

Director Benjamin seconded, and the motion carried.

- 10. Assistant Superintendent Ruth Gould gave a brief report on the special education program indicating that due to a change in practice which provided added service to the schools but added extra cost to travel expense, a directive was needed from the Board.

THIS MATTER coming before the District Boundary Board for Lane County, Oregon, upon a petition for merger of School District No. 43, Lane County, Oregon, into School District No. 4, Lane County, Oregon, and a hearing having been held on the 6th day of January, 1964, and sworn testimony having been received, and arguments having been heard, and the Boundary Board having been advised in the premises, hereby makes the following:

FINDINGS OF FACT

- 1. Said petition was presented to the District Boundary Board during the fiscal year 1963-64, to wit: On December 9, 1963.
- 2. That said petition was signed by all (5) of the current School District No. 43 Board members, the District Superintendent, and the District Clerk, all of whom are resident taxpayers and qualified voters in School District No. 43.
- 3. That the affected area is contiguous to School District No. 4, Lane County, Oregon.
- 4. That said petition was directed to the District Boundary Board of the county, to wit: Lane County, wherein the affected school districts lie.
- 5. That said petition contains a concise statement of the type of change requested.
- 6. That said petition contains the signatures and resident addresses of the petitioners and the names of the school districts in which they reside.
- 7. That said petition contains a legal description of the territory to be annexed and the school districts affected thereby.
- 8. That the District Boundary Board caused notice of the proposed change and the sessions of the board when the same would be considered to be published in at least two issues of a newspaper, to wit: Eugene Register Guard, having circulation in the school districts affected.
- 9. The first publication was not more than 25 days, nor less than 15 days preceding said session of the board, and the second publication was not more than 14 days, nor less than 8 days preceding such session of the board.

Order Granting Petition - 1

- 10. The proposed change will result in improvement of the educational facilities available to the children in the affected area, and will result in substantial operating economy for School District No. 43.
- 11. The proposed change is not made solely for tax advantages to the property owners in the affected area.
- 12. The proposed change is not likely to adversely affect any contemplated reorganization under the provisions of ORS 330.505 to 330.595, and 330.610 to 330.780.
- 13. The proposed change will have no substantial adverse effect upon the ability of the districts affected to provide the educational program required by law.

Subsequent to the hearing above mentioned as a result of which the above facts were found and within 20 days thereof a remonstrance was filed by more than 5% of the legal voters in School District No. 43, Lane County, Oregon. That Thereupon the District Boundary Board submitted the question of the proposed change to the voters of School District No. 43, Lane County, Oregon in the manner in which elections are held in such school district. The date of the election was Monday, February 3, 1964. The election results were canvassed by the District Boundary Board on Tuesday, February 4, 1964. From the canvass the District Boundary Board determined that a total of 371 votes were cast, of which 256 were in favor of the proposed change, 114 were against the proposed change, and one ballot was invalid. No remonstrance signed by legal voters in School District No. 4, Lane County, Oregon was filed with the District Boundary Board.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that School District No. 43, Lane County, Oregon be and the same is hereby merged into School District No. 4, Lane County, Oregon.



Secretary Parnell read a letter from the Board of District #4 and signed by Dr. Millard Pond, Superintendent-Clerk, stating that the Eugene School Board has gone on record as not opposing this boundary change.

Chairman Swanson asked for testimony from the floor.

Mr. Richard Miller, Chairman of the Eugene Board, spoke in confirmation of the letter previously read by Secretary Parnell. The Eugene Board reaffirmed their agreement with the written statements previously agreed upon by the Coburg and Eugene Boards.

- 14. Mr. Ed Cooper, Chairman of the Equilization Levy Study Committee, gave the final report of the committee:
 - A. That a state-wide study be undertaken to indicate methods whereby the Intermediate Education District Equilization Levy and State Basic School Support Funds might be coordinated and harmonized. Legislation along this line should then be prepared for consideration by the 1965 Legislature. (State School Boards Association is now investigating ways by which this can be accomplished. This was initiated by the Lane County Board Education.)
 - B. The beginning phase of the Intermediate Education District Equilization Levy as referred to in O.R.S. 334.260 speaks of "the estimated local school tax levies for operating purposes." Therefore, every effort should be made by the Intermediate Education District Board in computing the amount of this levy, to arrive at truly operational expenses.
 - C. In harmony with item (B), that all local district capital outlay expenses be deducted when computing the levy amount.
 - D. The item of uncollected taxes was discussed, but the Lane Superintendents recommended that this matter be left as at present whereby each local school district handles this locally.

Chairman Swanson thanked Mr. Cooper for the report and for the fine work of the committee, and said that the Board will study this report carefully.

15. Superintendent Parnell announced a meeting to be held at 7:30 P.M. on December 12th, at Springfield Junior High, concerning a Lane County Community College.

Director Elliott moved that the item of a Lane County Community College be included for discussion on the agenda of the next regular meeting of the Board, and that at the December 12th meeting the facilities of the Lane County Board of Education Office be made available to the committee studying the community college problem.

Mr Tuttle expressed his concern over an equalization law that would allow a district to receive equalization monies if the millage in that district were lower than a paying district. He suggested that it might be advisable to have a set millage to which every district must reach before being eligible for help.

12. Legislation regarding change to Intermediate Education District

10. Mr. Sam Huston explained briefly the present insurance policy of School District #4 on their Instructional Materials Center materials -- the problems involved in the housing of this material in the County Instructional Materials Center at 710 Pearl Street.

Director Hansen moved that Superintendent Parnell be directed to get together with the administrators of District #4, the insurance agent of District #4 and the agent for the Intermediate Education District for the purpose of negotiating a satisfactory insurance program. Director Johnson seconded, and the motion carried.

- 11. After some discussion, Director Elliott moved that through an arrangement with the Oregon Education Association, an additional secretary be employed to work on a temporary part-time basis for the Oregon Education Association and part-time for the Intermediate Education District. It is understood that the Oregon Education Association will pay one half the salary and any other expenses involved. This arrangement is to be reviewed periodically by the Board with the possibility of terminating or altering the agreement by mutual consent. Director Hansen seconded, and the motion carried.
- 12. SB 409 (Chapter 544) Creates the Intermediate Education District in lieu of the Rural School District. Secretary Parnell presented the salient features of this new law and its effect upon the Lane County operation. (Effective September 3, 1963)
- "Section 1. It is the purpose of this Act to provide maximum excellence in education and as nearly equal educational opportunities for all the children of this state as is feasible under optimum local control. In order to accomplish this purpose the Legislative Assembly intends that the intermediate education districts established under the provisions of this Act shall succeed the rural school district and provide professional services and facilities in education and shall furnish such services and facilities, on a cooperative basis with local districts, as may further the intent and purposes of this Act."
- 2/ Transfers the rights, powers, duties and obligations of the rural school board to the intermediate education district board.
- 3/ Permits Intermediate Education District (IED) to provide a wide range of special services to local districts when:
 - (a) These are agreed upon before March 1 by resolution of 2/3 of the local district boards having over 50 percent of the prior year ADM.
 - (b) The services are authorized by law.
 - (c) The Superintendent of Public Instruction approves.
- 4/ Permits IED to contract on reimbursable basis for other services.
- 5/ Transfers statutory duties from the county school superintendent to the IED Board. The superintendent becomes the executive officer of the board.

- 6/ The qualifications for board members remains as in the past. However, appointed budget committee members shall be local school board members.
- Λ procedure is established for consolidating an IED with another IED.
- 8/ A procedure is established for abolishing the office of the superintendent and his duties shall be carried out by the county seat local district superintendent.
- 9/ "344.240. (1) The intermediate education district board shall be subject in all respects to the Local Budget Law (ORS 294.305 to 294.415), except that in addition to other qualifications, members of the budget committee under ORS 294.410 who are not members of the intermediate education district board shall be directors of local school district boards within the intermediate education district. The board of ... the intermediate education district is authorized, not later than March 15 each year, to prepare and adopt a budget for its own expenses ... including expenses for travel, for providing the board ... with professional and clerical assistance, and for such services, equipment and supplies as the board ... may require. The board's expenses may include amounts necessary to provide special services and facilities as provided in subsection (1) of section 10 of this 1963 Act."

- 13. Director Swanson discussed the possibility of forming a group of Lane County citizens to study and discuss the Intermediate Equalization Tax Levy and its implications in the operation of the schools in Lane County. He was particularly interested in studying the effect of the levy upon the operation of the 18 local districts.

Director Elliott moved that Superintendent Parnell prepare a chart showing various financial statistics including millages, amounts and sources of income received by individual districts and present these facts at the next meeting. Further action will be determined after looking at the various facts. Director Hansen seconded, and the motion carried.

- 14. Tax Referral discussion
- 14. Implications of the tax referral matter were discussed and a decision was made to wait until after the School Boards Association Meeting, on September 18, before deciding on further action. The serious nature of this election was stressed.

- 15. The possibility of an informal meeting with former County Board and Budget Committee members of the past ten or twelve years was discussed. The purpose of the meeting would be to bring former members "up-to-date" on the activities of the Intermediate Education District. Further action on this was delayed until a future meeting.

- 16. Secretary Parnell discussed briefly the material on the new local budget law. It primarily means that an additional public hearing is to be held before the budget committee officially begins work on the budget. Personal services must be itemized in the two publications of the budget, and it legalizes revolving funds. For the Intermediate Board all budget freeholders must also be local board members.


Secretary Parnell read a letter from Mr. Walter Commons, Superintendent of Springfield Schools, explaining that the Springfield School District #19 plans to hold a bond election on or before September 26, 1963, and requesting that the Boundary Board delay their decision until after this election.

Mr. Richard Eymann spoke also on the need for an early hearing and the additional education benefits to be gained in the Springfield District, especially for the junior high and high school students.

Secretary Parnell presented a petition signed by 88 patrons of the Marcola District requesting the Board to reject the withdrawal of the proposed area from the Marcola School District.

Chairman Swanson asked Attorney Brownhill to comment on several questions that had been submitted to him earlier by the Board. Mr. Brownhill stated that the date of an election in not the date for the incurrance





of the indebtedness, but the time when the Board issues the bonds determines the date of indebtedness.

Secondly, Mr. Brownhill stated that if the Boundary Board allowed this change, the bonds of both Marcola and Springfield would apply to the area involved from the standpoint of long-term liability.

It was Mr. Brownhill's opinion that this boundary change would have no effect on the marketability of bonds, but he said that all attorneys did not agree with him on this point.

Mr. Brownhill made the following statements regarding the timing of the sale of bonds:

If the bonds were authorized before June 30, 1964, but issued and sold by the Board of Directors after June 30, 1964, the number of bonds which could be issued by the Marcola School District Board of Directors would be reduced by the assessed valuation of the area annexed to the Springfield School District under the formula set out in ORS 328.245 entitled "Limitation on Bonded Debt of School Districts Generally."

If the Marcola School District were to issue their bonds prior to June 30, 1964, and Springfield School District Board of Directors were to issue their bonds after June 30, 1964, the property owners of the affected area being transferred from the Marcola to the Springfield School District would be obligated and required to pay taxes on both sets of bonds.

Secretary Parnell stated that September 5, 1963, was the earliest date possible for a hearing, and recommended that the Board have the hearing as soon as possible on a date other than regular board meeting date, and delay decision on the hearing until after Springfield District bond election.

Director Hendrickson moved that the hearing on the proposed boundary change be held on Thursday, September 5, 1963, at 1:30 P.M. in Harris Hall. Director Benjamin seconded, and motion carried.

4. Insurance program discussed


4. Mr. Sam Huston, Board agent of record, reviewed the present status of the Board of Education's insurance coverage. He pointed out the difference in rate on the portion of insured material within the Courthouse, and that within the Osburn Apartments. He stated many factors contributed to the higher rate of the Osburn facilities; age and construction of building, residential apartments, mobile content of material, etc. Further discussion was held on the insurance coverage for materials in the Center belonging exclusively to Eugene, District No. 4.

Director Elliott moved that information and recommendations concerning insurance on the materials belonging to Eugene Public Schools, District No. 4, and housed in the Osburn facilities, be brought to the next Board meeting. Director Hendrickson seconded, and motion carried.

An open house at the new Instructional Materials Center facilities would precede this dinner and invitations would be extended to all board members attending the Regional Board Meeting.
- 6. Secretary Parnell announced the preview showing of Mr. Novak -- a new film and T.V. series depicting a teacher of today -- on Wednesday, August 21. This would be the first Westcoast preview showing of this educational N.B.C. series.
- 7. Secretary Parnell presented the financial report in two forms -the familiar and regular form as used in the past, and a parallel form
 as prepared by the data processing department. This latter form is to
 be used solely in the future.

- 15. Ruth Gould, Assistant Superintendent, presented a mock-up of a proposed brochure outlining the services of the Board of Education. The Board recommended the purchase of 2500 of these brochures at a



cost of \$240.00 from Quick Service Litho-Print Company. These pamphlets are to be distributed to all public school personnel in Lane County.

The regular meeting of the Lane County Board of Education for the Rural School District was held in Harris Hall, Courthouse, Eugene, with the following members present: Chairman Joe Richards, Laura Johnson, Vera Hansen, Milton Turay, Dorothy Leeper, Marvin Hendrickson, Ray Swanson, and Secretary Parnell. Also present were Register Guard reporters Don Robinson and Dean Rea; Aubrey Trimble, County School Office; Superintendent Kenneth Williams of Coburg; and Merle Short, Stanley Jensen, and Leon Funk of Coburg.
- Minutes approved
- 2. Director Turay requested that the minutes of December 10th be corrected with the following addition: Page 3, Item 14 (next to bottom line after the word participate), "as long as it would not interfere with services to the Lane County districts."

Director Hendrickson moved that the minutes of December 10th be approved with the correction. The motion was seconded by Director Hansen and carried.

Director Hansen moved that the minutes of the December 17th meeting at Harrisburg be filed for future reference. The motion was seconded by Director Leeper and carried.

3. Reports

3. Director Hansen indicated that she felt a need for this Board to keep in close touch with our Lane County Legislators on education matters.

Secretary Parnell presented a letter from the Coburg School Board stating their request to the Eugene School Board to accept their 10th, 11th and 12th grade students on a tuition basis commencing September, 1963 and continuing on this basis for a three year period.


Secretary Parnell presented a letter from Ray Osburn, State Department of Education, commending the Board on the County School Office operation.

Secretary Parnell presented a letter from the Oregon Study Council extending an invitation to the Board Members to visit Forest Grove on February 7th and 8th.

Secretary Parnell presented the final figures of the Lane County school census, as of October 25, 1962. The total amount shown was 58,112.

- 4. Financial report of the Board operation for the month of December was presented, discussed and filed.
- 5. The bills for the month of December, 1962, were presented and discussed. Director Hendrickson moved that the bills as presented be approved for payment. The motion was seconded by Director Turay and carried.

6. Director Hansen moved that the petition from Merle Short requesting transfer of his property from School District No. 43 to School District No. 4, which had been tabled previously, be taken from the table. The motion was seconded by Director Turay and <u>carried</u>.

Mr. Merle Short informed the Board that his request for the transfer was made mainly for the welfare of his son who attends 9th grade at Cal Young on a tuition basis, as he felt the high school at Coburg did not provide an adequate education. He pointed out that Eugene accepted his son at Cal Young on a tuition basis until the matter is settled.

Director Swanson asked Mr. Short if the requested boundary change is granted would it relieve him of tuition payments for the balance of the year?

Mr. Short stated that it would if the change were effective now.

Mr. Leon Funk of Coburg spoke in favor of this boundary change.

Mr. Short requested the Board to hold a hearing on his petition at the earliest possible date.

Director Johnson moved that a hearing on Mr. Short's petition be held on February 11, 1963, in Harris Hall. The motion was seconded by Director Turay and carried. The Superintendent is to check with the Coburg and Eugene Boards relative to this petition.

7. Letter from Coburg School Board Discussed 7. Superintendent Williams of Coburg stated that he did not know of any local opposition to the Coburg Board's proposal to send their top three grades to Eugene on a tuition basis. Mr. Stan Jensen of Coburg felt this proposal was being accepted quite well as the people know they have to do something.

Superintendent Williams explained that the proposal was for a contractual agreement to be made yearly for a period of three years.

Superintendent Parnell reported that he had received some phone calls from patrons opposing tuitioning students to Eugene, and who would like another vote.

Mr. Leon Funk substantiated Superintendent Parnell's statement. Patrons are afraid this arrangement might boomerang and defeat a future vote.

Superintendent Williams pointed out that Coburg has to take into consideration that the majority of people have said "no" to reorganization. He stated they had called the State Department in for help on this. The State Department made clear their position and what their action might be. The Coburg Board was faced with either joining with Harrisburg, voting a bond issue, or abandonment of their high school. After careful study they decided unanimously on the proposal of tuition to Eugene, if possible, but to keep the first nine grades in Coburg.

Superintendent Williams pointed out that the Eugene School District has unsold bonds and this may affect any boundary change.

Mr. Leon Funk asked if it wasn't possible for grades 7-8-9 to go to Eugene also on a tuition basis.



Cont'd.

Superintendent Williams stated they did not feel this was a wise plan.

Director Swanson stated that the County Board does not have jurisdiction in the tuition matter and therefore a statement should be relayed to the Eugene Board to the effect that the plan of the Coburg Board to tuition students to the Eugene School District would not appear to conflict with present reorganizations plans.

8. Keith Parks Lane Co. Adm. Ass't.

Mr. Keith Parks, Lane County Commissioners' Administrative Assistant, appeared before the Board relative to the problems of the County School Office space confronting the Board of Commissioners. He pointed out that the Board of Commissioners is faced with substantial building changes made necessary by reorganization under the County Charter, and that the space now housing the County School Office will be needed soon. Thus, it will be necessary for the County School Office to find other suitable quarters. When asked if the County Commissioners would consider building for the County School Office at the Fairgrounds or perhaps incorporating quarters in the building to be built for the County Extension Service, he pointed out that the Commissioners were not interested in doing this at this time, and that the Lane County Board of Education should make other negotiations for office space. The Commissioners would like the office space vacated by July 1, 1963, or as soon as possible after that.

Regarding the Service Bureau, Mr. Parks pointed out that the County Commissioners must discuss this more thoroughly, but it would appear that a joint Service Bureau operation would have a number of problems to iron out and he did not think the Commissioners were ready to move in this area.

Regarding Data Processing, Mr. Parks pointed out that the County Commissioners are very interested in a joint operation of this and want to discuss it soon. With the County Charter it will, no doubt, be necessary to expand facilities -- perhaps going to a 1440 IBM computer oriented operation. This appeals very much to the County.

Director Turay moved that Chairman Richards and Superintendent Parnell be authorized to explore further with the Commissioners the matter of office space and Service Bureau matters. Seconded by Director Hansen and carried.

Superintendent Parnell presented some tentative budget figures and Budget discussed the budget process. Discussion was held as to what general Preparation appropriation items the Board wished to have prepared for the Budget Committee consideration.

> Director Hendrickson moved that the proposed general appropriations and the general concept of the Service Bureau be presented to the Budget Committee for consideration. The motion was seconded by Director Hansen and carried. It was understood that this action did not mean commitments, but only gave the Superintendent guidance in preparing the budget instru-

Director Leeper moved that no amount be allowed in the budget for a distressed district fund for local districts from the Rural Levy, and that the date of May 6, 1963, be set for the Rural 6% Limitation election. The motion was seconded by Director Turay and carried.

LANE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING Rural School District Monday, September 24, 1962

Minutes in brief

- 1. Attendance
- 1. The regular meeting of the Lane County Board of Education for the Rural School District was held in the County School Office, Courthouse, Eugene, with the following members present: Vera Hansen, Laura Johnson, Dorothy Leeper, Ray Swanson, Milton Turay, Chairman Joe Richards, and Secretary Dale Parnell. Also present were: Mr. and Mrs. Dick Reed, Dr. Keith Goldhammer, Howard Buford, Jim Izett, Springfield News reporter Barbara Cloud, and Register Guard reporter Ralph Olive.
- 2. Boundary
 Board and
 Reorganization
- 2. Chairman Richards called the meeting to order and stated this meeting of the Lane County Board of Education was for the purpose of considering Boundary Board and Reorganization business.
- 3. Minutes Approved
- 3. Director Leeper moved that the minutes of the September 10, 1962 board meeting be approved as received by mail. Director Johnson seconded and the motion carried.
- 4. Boundary
 Board
 Business
- 4. Chairman Richards stated that the Boundary Board business is the consideration of the petition for the transfer of certain territory from School District No. 4 to School District No. 19; that Dr. Goldhammer of the University of Oregon and Howard Buford of the Planning Commission had been requested to attend the meeting.

Chairman Richards administered the oath to Dr. Goldhammer who gave the background as how he proceeded in his study on the boundaries of the metropolitan area school districts.

He stated that on this particular study of Districts No. 4, 19, and 52 the three boards got together and discussed plans to have a study made jointly for the development of a master boundary plan for this area. In February, 1960 he submitted copies of the report. At that time he recommended that the whole area that is now East of the freeway and South of the McKenzie River be transferred from District No. 4 to District No. 19. This would take into consideration Game Bird Village and Deadmond's Ferry area.

Director Swanson pointed out that the Boards of Districts No. 4 and 19 endorsed the Goldhammer Report but on this petition we find a difference of opinion. He asked if there is a proposal for an elementary school in this particular area and where it would be located?

Dr. Goldhammer did not know of any plan of District No. 4 for a school in this area. He pointed out that schools should be located for the best education of the children and the proper development of the community so the educational function can be utilized to the greatest efficiency of the taxpayer. He asked about the location of the Guy Lee

Boundary Board Business Continued

school in relation to this transfer and pointed out that a school across the street from residents whose children cannot attend usually adds up to trouble. The issue is not future plans but the current situation. Children associate with each other on all bases, not only schools. A bus runs East on Harlow Road to Springfield and West on Harlow Road to Eugene. The dollar for education is scarce. It is not good business to run buses in this manner. He is not in favor of a street being the boundary line for education units. "In the projections that we have made we know that eventually there will have to be several schools located in this area. We question there is a sufficient number of children in Game Bird Village and Deadmond's Ferry area for a single elementary school. We would envisage this as the dairy property to be served by the Lee School and another school to serve the North part of Game Bird Village and Deadmond's Ferry area in about 1980; another junior high school to serve the area known as the North Fifth and Page; a third high school for Springfield located in the area of the Page school. Thus, the whole area should be included in District No. 19 and not in District No. 4. Traffic is always a hazard for children, but I do not think the traffic on Harlow Road is too hazardous. A child on foot is in less danger than a child in a vehicle. Mr. Buford and I are in agreement with our pattern in this area. I have seen no evidence since presenting the report that would make me change my mind. "

Director Leeper asked Dr. Goldhammer if he used this development plan dated 1959? Did you agree with the neighborhood areas. That Beverly Park would be served by the Lee School?

Dr. Goldhammer projected 259 children for Beverly Park. He pointed out that elementary schools for metropolitan areas should not have more than 500 children. Beverly Park will have less than a full school. Deadmond's Ferry and Game Bird Village area will have more than enough for one school but not enough for two.

Director Johnson asked if the dairy is being subdivided?

Dr Goldhammer - "My supposition is that this whole area will be divided. When I refer to the Game Bird Village I refer to everything North of Harlow Road. Everything that is approximately North of Q Street and West of the Farm Road as extended, that area would require two elementary schools and 2/5 of a junior high school. We are talking about 25 years into the future on this, based upon studies made by the Planning Commission.

Director Johnson asked how many houses were in the tentative plan?

Dr. Goldhammer - "For each elementary school we project somewhat less than .6 of a child per residential development. For 500 children you would have to have over 800 homes. It takes approximately 1000 homes to require an elementary school at the size we would consider for this area."

Dick Reed stated that his property contains 170 acres and if subdivided there would be between three and four houses per acre. This allows for streets and a park. There has to be a division somewhere between schools.



Boundary Board Business Continued Chairman Richards administered the oath to Howard Buford of the Planning Commission, who generally agreed with the proposals contained in Dr. Goldhammer's report.

Director Leeper asked Mr. Buford which was most hazardous, foot traffic or the freeway?

Mr. Buford pointed out that there is much conjection on Harlow Road; that it was highly desirable to make it unnecessary to cross this street. He stated he would rather have children in a bus crossing a freeway that independently going across the street.

Chairman Richards asked Mr. Buford that on the Reed property drawing was there some discussion as to plans for a school in this area?

Mr. Buford replied that at the Southwest corner of Game Bird Village, which Mr. Reed referred to, was an imaginative proposal of the Planning Office for a school.

Director Hansen suggested that Student Patrols operated in the area would be very beneficial and that the road hazard on Harlow Road did not appear any more surmountable than other areas of our county.

Mr. Buford stated that what Dr. Goldhammer states in his report calls for less than an 18-20 room school to serve each of these areas. If anything, it is an underestimate of what is going to happen. As areas mature the price of land goes up and more units will need the property. The plan Mr. Reed refers to is what we have recommended.

Secretary Parnell asked Mr. Buford if he would foresee a problem involved in a crossing at or near Lee School?

Mr. Buford felt that Harlow Road is going to serve as a major traffic way and will continue.

Director Leeper asked if there might be a possible commercial development of Harlow Road and if so, could this make more dwellings North of Harlow?

Mr. Buford pointed out that commercial developments had already been granted along Harlow Road and he could see little further commercial development.

Chairman Richards administered the oath to Mrs. Dick Reed who asked Mr. Buford if he did not think it would be desirable to keep the dairy and Game Bird Village in one unit and provide a school in this unit?

Mr. Buford stated that all plans he had projected had included this as a unit.

Mrs. Reed pointed out that the "Q" Street-Laura Street area is as large as the dairy area and could not understand why Dr. Goldhammer has not made provisions for homes in this area.



Boundary Board Business Continued Dr. Goldhammer pointed out that there were some provisions for residential property. Basically, the question you raise, as far as the long-term plan, is true. All of this area should be considered a single area.

Mrs. Reed stated that since there are no children in the area the need is not immediate.

Dr. Goldhammer - "My suspicion is that Springfield purchased the Lee School land prior to actually knowing the location of the children."

Jim Izett, Springfield Board member, stated that the purchase of the Lee School site was done long before any of this thinking. The Plan did not exist when the site was purchased.

Director Swanson asked if there was a conflict between Mr. Buford and Dr. Goldhammer.

Dr. Goldhammer stated that population change takes place over a gradual period. You will have to have two schools in this area before you have three. I agree with Mr. Buford's reasoning but I am thinking in terms of the next 25 years and I can see two schools emerging in this area during that time. Eventually three schools may be desirable-locating the second school much further to the North of Mallard Lane. My answer to your question is that I see two schools for now. Lee School serving its present area plus the dairy property and a new school serving Game Bird Village-Deadmond's Ferry area.

Director Hansen pointed out that all of this area belongs to Willamalane Park and children will avail themselves of the Park's activities.

Mrs. Reed stated that Willamalane also owns a park area on Mallard Lane.

Mr. Buford pointed out that we should look at the Deadmond's Ferry area. He felt it will increase in intensity but not development nearly as rapidly as the rest of the area.

Dr. Goldhammer - "As I see this boundary change proposal, it does not encompass the intention of our report. It changes only one boundary for another boundary which does not encompass the same objective. Our Plan called for the inclusion of the Game Bird Village and the Deadmond's Ferry area into the Springfield School District. Anything other than this would not complete the objective. By doing it piecemeal we have three or four conflicts over the issue instead of one. When housing goes up it will cause friction in the Lee School area. We should consider what is best for children and what we are going to get for the dollar spent on education. Are we making the most effective use of our educational dollar or are we going to put patches on a leaky ship? Eugene and Springfield is one metropolitan area and we should set about to solve this problem. Actually as we look at the metropolitan area, no school district boundaries really make much sense. One school district would serve the metropolitan area most admirably."



Motion Defeated Director Johnson moved that the motion be called from the table. The motion was seconded by Director Hansen and carried. Chairman Richards then called for a vote on the motion that petition be granted. The motion was defeated by the following vote:

- l Abstained
- 1 "No" vote was cast by Chairman Richards (breaking the tie) who explained his reasons as follows:

There had been insufficient showing of evidence on the part of District No. 19 to show this is the best for the children, or the economic dollar. The evidence is all projected in the future. There appears to be little harm in waiting until the area has developed and there are houses. Then the people involved can decide where they want their children to attend school.

Secretary Parnell thanked Dr. Goldhammer and Howard Buford for appearing before the meeting.

Dick Reed thanked the Board for their time and consideration.

5. Reorganization

> Marcola-Springfield

5. Secretary Parnell stated that he had met recently with the Springfield and Marcola School Boards and that the Joint Statement of facts, as presented, was approved. The two boards were not recommending the merger, but only agreeing on certain facts as they saw them. It will now be necessary for the Board to draw up the plan and set a date for the County Hearing. He pointed out that the Marcola Board would like this issue resolved before budgets are made for the coming year.

Director Johnson moved that Secretary Parnell make the necessary arrangements for a hearing to be held in the Mohawk High School on Wednesday, October 17, 1962. The motion was seconded by Director Hansen and carried.

Director Swanson moved that Superintendent Parnell be authorized to meet with citizens, at their request, for the purpose of providing pertinent information in making their decisions on reorganization issues. The motion was seconded by Director Turay and carried.

Coburg-Harrisburg Superintendent Parnell reported that he had met with the Linn County Superintendent relative to a plan for the Harrisburg-Coburg area. It was felt that it would be best to hold a vote on this issue in January or February, prior to making budgets for the coming year. It was recommended that a tentative plan be drawn up and sent to all component districts included, and requesting their suggestions and recommendations. As soon as these are received from the component districts, a joint meeting of the Linn and Lane County Boards will be set up. Secretary Parnell requested that he be authorized to draw up a tentative draft.



Director Turay moved that Secretary Parnell draw up a tentative draft for the reorganization of the Harrisburg-Coburg area and send to the component districts for suggestions. The motion was seconded by Director Swanson and carried.

Director Turay moved that the Board oppose this proposal due to many complications that can be foreseen. Director Swanson seconded and the motion carried.

Minutes in brief

LANE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING Rural School District Monday, September 10, 1962

- 1. Attendance
- 1. The regular meeting of the Lane County Board of Education for the Rural School District was held in the County School Office, Court House, Eugene with the following members present: Vera Hansen, Marvin Hendrickson, Laura Johnson, Dorothy Leeper, Ray Swanson, Milton Turay, Chairman Joe Richards, Secretary Dale Parnell, and several interested citizens.
- 2. Reading of Minutes
- 2. Chairman Richards called the meeting to order and called for a motion to dispense with the reading of the last boundary board minutes. Director Hendrickson moved that we forgo the reading of the minutes. The motion was seconded by Director Hansen and carried.
- 3. Minutes Approved
- 3. Director Johnson moved that the minutes of August 13, 1962 board meeting be approved as received by mail. Director Turay seconded and the motion carried.
- 4. Boundary
 Board
 Business
- 4. Chairman Richards opened the discussion on the proposal from District No. 19 to transfer certain territory from School District No. 4 to School District No. 19.

Secretary Parnell presented the following opinion from Attorney Riddlesbarger regarding the above proposed change:

Legal Opinion

"In our opinion the fact that there are no children in the area involved in parcel one is not determinative of the right of the district boundary board to make the proposed change. One of the other of the matters set forth in ORS 329.730 (2) (b) is to be found. Thus, if the board found that the proposed change would result in substantial operating economies in the districts affected it would be sufficient, notwithstanding the non-existence of children in one of the areas. This operating economy need not be at the present time, but could be in the future. The decision is discretionary with the board and is only reversible for an abuse of this discretion. If the board after fully considering the matter, finds that the proposed change meets the requirements of ORS 329.730 (2) as set out on page one of this letter, there is no legal reason why the change should not be made. "

Further, relative to ORS 329.730 (7) "This subsection requires that the matter be submitted to the voters of the districts if the school district to be annexed has ten (10) or more children of school age. - - * * * In our opinion this subsection refers only to annexation of a whole district, and does not refer to a bondary change in any portion of a school district. - - * * * *."

Director Hansen moved that the District No. 19 petition be granted. Motion was seconded by Director Swanson.

Director Swanson questioned whether or not the Goldhammer boundary study report included the Reed property in the same school district as the Gamebird Village and Deadmond's Ferry area.

Secretary Parnell read from the Goldhammer report that the property South of the McKenzie River and West of the freeway will probably be solid residential and should be transferred to School District No. 19.

Director Swanson stated he would like more information from Dr. Goldhammer regarding projected location of schools before making a decision. He pointed out that the basic Goldhammer report was adopted by the Eugene and Springfield school boards. We find the Eugene Board not in favor of this piece-meal change and the Springfield Board in favor. The difference between the two boards seems to hang up on this point.

Motion Tabled Director Swanson moved that the Board table the motion, pending a conference with Dr. Goldhammer and Mr. Buford of the Planning Commission, until the next regular meeting or a specially called meeting. Motion was seconded by Director Leeper and carried. The Secretary was instructed to arrange for this meeting on September 24th if possible.

Coburg Board Letter Secretary Parnell presented a letter from the Coburg School Board listing the following recommendations adopted at their August 20th board meeting:

- a. Hold up on the consideration of boundary changes in the Coburg District until a Harrisburg-Coburg election can be held.
- b. The Coburg Board has no plans at this time for the calling of a bond issue to build a new high school.
- c. The Coburg Board is in favor of allowing the people to vote on a plan of reorganization between Harrisburg and Coburg school districts.
- d. Another election with Eugene should not be considered at this time, but to consider after a reorganization election with Harrisburg and Coburg.

Director Swanson cited that a consolidation election of Districts No. 4 and 43 lost; that three reorganization elections of Districts No. 4 and 43 lost; that numerous boundary changes have been made.

Director Swanson felt the Committee should now work with the Linn County Board and propose a plan that would offer the people the opportunity to vote on a plan that would combine Harrisburg and Coburg. This is proposed as the law provides that local Boards shall act in an advisory capacity in preparing a suitable plan. If the people do not favor the plan proposed by the Committee; therefore, some alternate plan may be proposed.

Harrisburg-Coburg Plan Proposed Director Swanson moved that we enter into discussion with the Linn County Board concerning a plan of reorganization including the component elementary districts of the Harrisburg Union High School and

Coburg. Motion was seconded by Director Leeper and carried. Secretary Parnell was instructed to set up a meeting with the Linn County Board to discuss the formation of a plan.

Merle Short of the Coburg School District requested the exclusion of his property from such a plan. He stated he was putting his boy in the Eugene schools under a tuition basis. He felt he was entitled to one boy in the Eugene schools for the taxes he pays in the Eugene district. He had no opposition to holding off on his petition, but was interested that it be kept alive.

Director Swanson felt that if the whole Coburg area goes with Harrisburg it should be a Lane County district. He did not feel it is feasible to bite off chunks of the Coburg district by boundary changes. He feels the Coburg-Harrisburg proposal has to be reconciled. Mr. Short's petition is presently tabled pending a basic policy decision of the Board. At the present time it is under study. Mr. Short requested that he be notified before any action is taken.

Mr. Leon Funk, Coburg, asked if the Board had a legal ruling relative to more than 10 people going out of a district.

Secretary Parnell referred him to the legal opinion rendered by Attorney Riddlesbarger quoted previously in the minutes.

- The financial report to September 1, 1962 was presented, discussed, and approved.
- 6. The bills for the month were presented and discussed. Director Turay moved that the bills as presented be paid. Director Hendrickson seconded and the motion carried.
- 7. Secretary Parnell presented a resolution to authorize a short-term loan for the purpose of meeting current expenses between the present time and tax turnover time in December. He explained that previously the County Treasurer had thought she could carry the office until tax turnovers are made but has been advised by her auditor that she cannot do so. The amount needed between now and December is about \$100,000. Mr. Virgil Cameron of the First National Bank had been contacted and stated the interest on the proposal would be at the rate of 3-3/4%.

Director Swanson moved the resolution to authorize a short-term loan with the First National Bank of Oregon in the amount of \$100,000 be approved. Director Hendrickson seconded and the motion carried.

Secretary Parnell informed the board that the County P.T.A. is making a bid for the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers to hold their 1963 State Convention in Eugene.

Director Hendrickson moved that the Lane County Board of Education extend an invitation to the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers to hold their 1963 State Convention in Eugene. Motion was seconded by Director Leeper and carried.

Secretary Parnell presented to the Board the idea (as previously discussed last January) of the establishment of a Lane County Industry Education Council. The Board expressed further interest in the proposal and urged the Superintendent to explore the possibilities further.

10. Assistant Superintendent Ruth Gould presented an over-all picture of the present status and progress of the establishment of the Lane County Instructional Materials Center - relating to films, tapes, film strips, great art prints, curriculum aid kits, records, and etc. A policy for use of the Center was discussed.

Director Hansen moved that the use of the films and materials be limited to public schools in the districts comprising the Lane County Rural School District, in accordance with the language contained in the rental and loan agreements. Motion was seconded by Director Johnson and carried.

Relative to the distribution of the catalog it was agreed that a charge of \$1.00 per catalog be made to other than Lane County Public School personnel -- this to be at the discretion of the Superintendent.

- 11. Marcola-Springfield Proposal
- 11. Secretary Parnell announced that arrangements had been made for the Marcola and Springfield School Boards to meet jointly on September 17th to draft a final agreement on the reorganization plan including the Marcola and Springfield School Districts. Perhaps the Board might want to consider this plan at the September 24th meeting. The consensus indicated the "green light" on this schedule.
- 12. Oregon Study
 Council Invitation
- 12. Invitation was extended to the members of the Rural School Board to visit the Klamath County School District on September 27th and 28th as sponsored by the Oregon School Study Council.
- 13. Office In-service Program
- 13. Secretary Parnell presented an outline of a personnel plan as a portion of the office in-service program for the 1962-63 year.

Director Hendrickson moved that the office in-service program as outlined be approved. The motion was seconded by Director Leeper and carried.

14. Youth Study Board 14. Secretary Parnell introduced Don Call, (Research Director of the Lane County Youth Study Board) who informed the Board that a Youth Study Board was in existence which parellels the Guidance Committee earlier appointed by the Board; that the Youth Study Board is to receive a grant from the Federal Government in the amount of \$192,000 to carry out the project. Mr. Call pointed out that practically all recognized agencies have pledged their support in the project, which includes the study of delinquency and drop-outs. The research grant of \$192,000 is to stretch over an 18 month period.

Gordon Dudley, Director of Pupil Personnel Services, explained the drop-out study previously set up, and with the grant it would appear we have available to us the sources we need to go into it cooperatively.

It was generally agreed that since this opportunity has arisen, that the Superintendent write letters to each of the Guidance Committee people to relate this development and to relate a postponement of further Guidance Committee work until the possibilities of the Youth Study proposals have been ascertained.

It was further generally agreed to offer whatever office support possible to the Youth Study Board.



- 15. IMC Hours
- 15. Secretary Parnell announced that part-time help has been secured whereby the office would be open between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 10:00 P.M., Monday through Thursday; 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on Friday; and 9:00 A.M. to 11:00 A.M. on Saturdays.
- 16. Letter to the Editor
- 16. Director Swanson called attention to a letter to the editor appearing in the Register-Guard relative to helping small schools. The article suggested that more effort be given to building the curriculum in the small schools rather than putting so much effort in building larger schools. Mr. Swanson felt that an answer might be given to this article relating the various County Office aids to such schools.
- 17. Budget Committee
- 17. The matter of election of budget committee members was discussed. It was agreed to postpone this until the October 8th meeting.
- 18. The next meeting of the Board for the consideration of Reorganization and Boundary Board business will be held on September 24th, 1962, 1:30 P.M. The next regular meeting of the Board of Education will be held on October 8, 1962, at 1:30 P.M. Both meetings will be held in the County School Office.

LANE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING Rural School District Monday, August 13, 1962

- 1. Attendance
- 1. The regular meeting of the Lane County Board of Education for the Rural School District was held in Harris Hall, Courthouse, Eugene with the following members present: Vera Hansen, Marvin Hendrickson, Laura Johnson, Dorothy Leeper, Ray Swanson, Milton Turay, Chairman Joe Richards, Secretary Dale Parnell, and several interested citizens.
- 2. Boundary Board Business
- 2. Chairman Richards called the meeting to order and stated the first business on the agenda was the petition from Springfield requesting the change of boundaries along the freeway between Eugene District No. 4 and Springfield District No. 19.

Oath Explained The following persons were scheduled to speak: Mr. Gordon Vance, Chairman of School District No. 19 Board; Mr. Richard Miller, Chairman of School District No. 4 Board; Mr. and Mrs. Dick Reed; Attorney Donald Husband (representing the Reeds), and, Al Lindley. Inasmuch as Boundary Board business was a legal hearing, the Chairman indicated that he would administer the following oath to each person speaking on the facts:

"I promise to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth, so help me God."

Secretary Parnell read the Springfield petition requesting boundary changes between the Eugene and Springfield School Districts and projected the present boundaries and the proposed changes on the overhead projector.

Vance Testimony

Gordon Vance took the oath and made the following statements:

"That he would like to correct a statement which was made -- That I am not Chairman, I am ex-chairman of District No. 19. I am quite familiar with the facts of the proposed change, however. I would like to point out a few things which we feel are pertinent. Parcels #1 and #3 are both areas which, under the present conditions, are isolated to the school district serving them. Area #1 is bounded on two sides by District No. 19 and on the third side by the freeway, which does not allow access to the property. Area #3 is bounded on three sides by District No. 4 and on the fourth side by the freeway, and is isolated from the district serving it. Another similarity in these two areas is that there is no protest from parents involving the action. In Area #3 all parents favor. In Area #1 there are no children involved. The valuation of the areas is approximately the same. Neither district would lose valuation. Other facts: District No. 19 made substantial investment in the Lee School located directly across the road from Parcel #1. In order to promote a cooperative school and park (Willamalane Park District) District No. 19 will plan a joint development and thus avoid duplicate expenditures. The transfer of territory in this



petition would be efficient and economical in educating children in this area. Also, no duplication of school transportation services would exist. We do not feel that single transfer of areas should be made where a comparable exchange can be made."

Miller Testimony Richard Miller took the oath and made the following statements: "On July 24th a letter was directed to Superintendent Parnell from Dr. Millhollen concerning the two petitions that are under discussion at this meeting. It is the opinion of the Eugene Board that this petition (the Springfield petition) should not be granted for the primary reason that this would jeopardize subsequent conditions to the Master Plan. The board is in favor of the transfer of Parcel #3, as they feel there are children living there now who have attended Eugene schools. We protest the transfer of Parcel #1 as there are no children living in the area and also the belief of the board that District No. 4 would lose valuation. In Parcel #3 there are children and it would be satisfactory to make the change. It is the question of the Eugene and Springfield boards as to just how the Master Plan should be implemented. It is the opinion of the Eugene board that this is not the proper way at this time."

Boundary Board member Dorothy Leeper questioned the difference in assessed valuation of Parcels #1 and #3?

Richard Miller - "I do not feel this is the issue with the Eugene Board at this time. The District No. 4 Board simply feels the timing for such a change is wrong.

Boundary Board Chairman Richards called attention to ORS 329.730, (2) (b), which states:

"The proposed change will result in improvement of the educational facilities available to the children in the area transferred or in the area comprising a newly created district or in areas of districts being abolished and attached to existing or newly created districts or will result in substantial operating economies in the districts affected."

He asked Mr. Miller: "Do you think that in view of the fact there are no children in Parcel #1 that this board has the power to change childless land?"

Richard Miller - "Yes, I think when the legislature culminated such criteria to be considered by the board that it was thinking of all assessed value land. I do not have the assessed valuation of Parcel #1. We recognize there is some assessed valuation and recognize some compelling reason for the change if there were children. We are not saying that it should be done piece by piece or at one time. If there is a step by step procedure we have not agreed what should be the first step. We have not gone on record -- except as approving the Master Plan."

Reed Testimony Dick Reed took the oath and made the following statements: "Mrs. Reed has lived on this place for some 35 or 36 years. She has educated her family in the Eugene schools and my family has also been educated in Eugene. We are attached to the Eugene schools. We have

been real cooperative in all the changes that have come along. In the future we would like to see Eugene and Springfield cities together. There is no hard feeling except we feel real badly that we have not been contacted by the Springfield Board about this change. We want you to know that we do not want to come into the Springfield district for the reasons mentioned. In regard to what Mr. Vance said, when they put in the freeway there is no barrier as far as children are concerned. If they would separate us from Game Bird Village there may be problems. No doubt the area will be sub-divided. In Game Bird Village 90% came in and protested and they were left off. We protest and do not want it. (Mr. Reed presented a map showing proposed subdivision made by Mr. Buford of the Planning Commission, including the Reed property and the Calef property.) Another thing regarding our land, we cannot tell whether it will be homes or something else."

Mrs. Reed agreed that her testimony would be the same as that given by her husband.

Chairman Richards asked Mr. Reed the valuation of Parcels #1 and #3.

Mr. Reed assumed the assessed or potential value was about the same.

Director Swanson asked Mr. Reed if there are homes adjacent to his property across the road that would be in Springfield?

Mr. Reed stated that there were about 80 homes in Beverly Park and also some houses along the road. These homes have a Eugene address.

Director Johnson asked if the children could walk to Washington School?

Mr. Reed stated that the children in Game Bird Village go to the Willakenzie School and go through the underpass.

Husband Testimony

Donald Husband, Attorney for the Reeds, took the oath and made the following statements: "I feel Mr. Richards has put his finger on this situation. The new law set up some criteria. Previously there was no criteria on which the Boundary Board could operate. I feel the Reeds can say the Boundary Board has no legal basis for making this change. No argument on 329.730 (1), but we do come within (2) (b) of that section: "The proposed change will result in improvement of the educational facilities available to the children in the area transferred or in the area comprising a newly created district or in the areas of districts being abolished and attached to existing or newly created districts or will result in substantial operating economies in the districts affected. There is not a child in Parcel #1. In addition, we would have to find where it would improve educational facilities. Both Eugene and Springfield are excellent school districts. I do not think the board has any basis legally for changing. The new law was put in to give some guideposts for boundary changes. Mrs. Reed wishes it to remain as it now is. The farm has been used many years for a dairy and they are very happy with the present arrangement. .Dr. Goldhammer's study no doubt brought this about. According to law the District Boundary Board has no power to annex a school district having more than ten children to one or more districts without a vote of the people. Game

Bird Village did not wish to become annexed to District No. 19. The freeway has not proven to be a barrier. You go up and over the freeway is the only change. I do not think this Boundary Board should make any change at this time."

Lindley Petition

Al Lindley took the oath and made the following statements: "We can appreciate all that has been said today. We are concerned with Parcel #3. Parcels #1 and #2 do not affect us. In our area there are six homes and 100% of the parents favor. The area just south of the Day Island area is a part of the metropolitan park. The area directly west will soon be in the city of Eugene. In the Chase Gardens area there is going to be a subdivision. There will be thirty-one homes directly west of our house. Nine students are involved this year. We feel this change should be made now. I know that the residents in the area would not be so receptive next year as they are this year. We are on Eugene Rural Route, Eugene Telephone, Eugene Water, and a Fire District is under consideration. Nearly all social organizations figure the freeway as the dividing line. If division takes place very likely Eugene school buses will come down our street to pick those children up. Also, if our children had to cross the freeway they would cross on an overpass on Centennial Drive. This is a very fast street and not considered safe. We feel we fit in on the section of law quoted in ORS 329.730, (2) (b).

Director Leeper asked if the children living in the six houses mentioned attend in Springfield?

Al Lindley answered that not all of them had been attending in Springfield,

Chairman Richards stated that the board is also hearing the Lindley petition at this time, since Mr. Lindley must leave the hearings as soon as possible.

Donald Husband asked if it is the theory of the Boundary Board if they must accept all parcels listed on a petition or may accept one or more of the parcels listed?

Director Leeper - "We must first accept or reject the Springfield petition then act upon the Lindley petition separately.

Secretary Parnell stated there was no response from local owners in Parcel #2. This includes only a small amount of territory around the Q St. interchange and was also recommended in the Goldhammer report.

Chairman Richards asked if anyone else had a question to ask at this time.

Gordon Vance apologized to the Reeds for not being invited into Springfield. He further pointed out that, "the address of the Lee school is 4300 Harlow Road, Eugene; that many people in Beverly Park have a Eugene address and telephone exchange. At the time the parcel for Lee school was purchased in 1956 there was no thought of boundary changes. I think it is very pertinent in education that we think of the future. We have seen the character of this country change so rapidly. The time to make a decision is to make it before homes and children are in the

proposed changes. Now is the time to make a change. As to the proposed land development in Parcel #1 made by Mr. Buford of the Planning Commission, was this made as a service or was it at the request of the Reeds?" He also asked, "if the assessed value of the entire Parcel #3 is greater than the value of Parcel #1, since much of Parcel #3 is included in a park area. The proposed change of a parcel of land would be taken in consideration on what the probable future development of this land would be. This is an area that is surrounded by residences. A great deal of it will be homes in the not too distant future. Consideration should be given to this change now before it becomes all homes.

Dick Reed - In july, 1960, Mr. Buford suggested that he do this as he was very much interested. It was done mutually, I am sure that Parcel #1 in assessed valuation has perhaps 10 times the potential as Parcel #3. The Parcel #1 property is assessed at approximately \$900 per acre.

Gordon Vance asked Mr. Reed if his property was in the Willamalane Park district?

Mr. Reed answered that it was.

Mrs. Reed asked, if their property is subdivided where would grade school children go to school?

Gordon Vance - "All 16 rooms of the Guy Lee school will be used.

About 100 pupils living in Menlo Park attend here though. We have purchased property in the Menlo Park area so when that school is built the children living in that area will attend that school. Eugene will provide schools as Springfield will do, if the number of children calls for such. We have attempted to locate schools so that children can walk to school in a radius area. Eugene, I'm sure, does the same."

Mrs. Lindley - In Parcel #3 the assessed valuation of \$80,000 is just for homes - it does not take in the park area.

Director Swanson asked if the Board of District No. 4 had a separate feeling on the Lindley petition?

Dr. Pond, Superintendent of District No. 4, stated District No. 4 would favor transferring Parcel #3 at this time, but according to their Board minutes, had not stated a position on Parcel #1 and #2.

Director Johnson asked if District No. 4 and Willamalane Park district could have joint cooperation?

Dr. Pond said that he could see no reason why they couldn't.

Chairman Richards asked the Board for a motion on action to be taken.

Director Hansen moved that the Springfield petition be adopted. There was no second and the motion died for lack of a second.

Director Swanson moved that the Springfield petition be taken under advisement. Director Hansen seconded and the motion carried.

Lindley Petition Granted The Lindley petition requesting the transfer of certain territory from School District No. 19 to School District No. 4 was read by Secretary Parnell.

"Beginning at the intersection of County Road No. 388 with the centerline of the relocated Pacific Highway No. 99; thence North 87'30' West to the East line of D. L. C. No. 57; thence West 2.66 chains; thence South 19.33 chains to the South line of D. L. C. 57; thence West 7.34 chains; thence South to the Willamette River; thence up said river to its intersection with said Pacific Highway; thence Northerly along said Pacific Highway to the place of beginning."

Director Leeper moved that the Lindley petition be granted, and to become effective immediately. Director Hendrickson seconded and the motion carried.

Coburg Petition Received Secretary Parnell presented a petition from Mr. Merle Short, of School District No. 43, Coburg, to take territory from School District No. 43 and add to School District No. 4, Eugene. The petition was signed by 12 legal voters and represents 34 acres of land with a valuation of \$25,000. The land is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Merle Short. They have one school age child.

Director Turay moved that the petition be taken under advisement and considered at some future meeting. Director Swanson seconded and the motion carried.

A request was made to Secretary Parnell to secure legal opinion on ORS 329.730, (2) (b). Also on other legal aspects pertaining to petitions containing more than one parcel, childless area, and other Boundary Board procedures.

Chairman Richards declared the Boundary Board business concluded and stated the next Boundary Board meeting would be held on September 10, 1962 at 1:30 P.M. Standard time.

- 3. Chairman Richards reported on the meeting held recently in the Wyatt School district. He reported that the meeting was attendedy by approximately 100 persons representing two groups one group approving the joining of Coburg schools with Harrisburg schools, the other group disapproving the joining of Coburg with Harrisburg. He felt no one showed a great deal of interest in the Coburg-Harrisburg merger. The main question in this area was high school education.

- 4. Director Hendrickson moved that the minutes of July 9, 1962 board meeting be approved as received by mail. Director Hansen seconded and the motion carried.

- 5. The financial statement for the Month of July, 1962 was presented. Director Turay moved that the financial statement be accepted. Director Leeper seconded and the motion carried.

- 6. The bills for the month were presented and discussed. Director Hendrickson moved that the bills as presented be paid. Director Turay seconded and the motion carried.

LANE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

Rural School District Monday, July 9, 1962

- 1. Attendance
- 1. The regular meeting of the Lane County Board of Education for the Rural School District was held in the Lane County School Office with the following members present: Directors Laura Johnson, Vera Hansen, Milton Turay, Ray Swanson, Marvin Hendrickson, Dorothy Leeper, Chairman Joe Richards, and Secretary Dale Parnell. Register Guard reporter Ralph Olive and Sam Houston of the McCracken Insurance Agency were also present.

At the opening of the meeting approximately 40 patrons of the Coburg School District appeared and the space being inadequate in the library, the meeting was adjourned to Harris Hall.

- 2. Canvass of Coburg Election
- 2. The results of the June 27, 1962 election in the Coburg School District were presented by Secretary Parnell, which were as follows:

To approve the Inclusion of District #43 in the Proposed Administrative District -----204

To reject the Inclusion of District #43 in the Proposed Administrative District -----210

(Note: 418 persons were listed on the Poll List. I void ballot was cast. 3 "yes" votes that were challenged were illegal as they were not on the list of legal voters as checked by the County Elections Department.)

Director Leeper moved that the canvass of the Coburg election results be accepted and the election declared lost. The motion was seconded by Director Turay and carried.

- 3. Alternatives for the Coburg District Discussed
- 3. Chairman Richards opened the meeting for discussion of the Coburg School District situation. Leon Funke, Coburg, stated he was interested in obtaining a petition to withdraw from the Coburg District and add to the Eugene District. Approximately thirty other patrons present indicated by a raise of hands that they were also interested in withdrawing from the Coburg District for the principle reason of high school educational advantages in the Eugene District.

Secretary Parnell called attention to the legal requirement that any transfer of territory from one district to another requires that the

territory be contiguous. He also explained that the duties of the Reorganization Committee were delegated to the Rural School Board on July 1, 1962, and that another Reorganization election on the plan to form an administrative school district of the Eugene and Coburg school districts could not be held until after May 7, 1963.

Director Swanson felt that when a known situation is changed to an unknown situation controversy results. It is going to be harder to accomplish plans in the future. The State Department has been holding off being too critical of the Coburg High School pending the outcome of elections, but there is a chance they might get tough now regarding standardization.


Kenneth Williams, Superintendent, Coburg, felt the Rural Board should supply them with guide-lines. The Harrisburg situation is a difficult situation as there are separate elementary and high school districts. Whatever is done should be done along guide-lines of regorganization - Grades 1 through 12. The best alternative was an affirmative vote. Whatever takes place now should be through coordinated efforts. He feels that unless things are handled carefully, there is a possibility of creating a civil war which would greatly interfere with the educational program.

There is an outside group from Harrisburg working for the unification of the Coburg and Harrisburg districts and there is some sentiment in Coburg for such a plan.

By a consensus of the Rural Board it was decided to ask the Coburg Board for reaction and recommendation on the following:

- a. What is the Coburg reaction to boundary change that would bring some Coburg residents into the Eugene district?
- b. What does the Coburg Board think of further discussion on the question of unifying the Coburg and Harrisburg schools? This proposal has been considered in the past.
- c. Is there any possibility of calling a bond issue election, to raise funds for a new high school in Coburg?
- d. Is there still interest in another election to bring the Eugene and Coburg districts together?

The Board then returned to the library in the County School Office for the remainder of the meeting.



4. Sam Houston of the McCracken Insurance Agency presented recommended coverage for the Lane County School Office as follows:

Instructional Materials Coverage

- a. The floater policy on the instructional materials has a limit of \$200,000 coverage in the Court House Building, \$20,000 at any other location and \$10,000 in transit. The deposit premium for the policy will be \$360.00. Monthly reports of actual value will be made and the premium adjusted on the laverage of the monthly reports at a rate of 36¢ per \$100.00
- b. We recommend that the equipment owned by the County Board and permanently located in the office be insured for: fire, extended coverage, and vandalism. The rate for this coverage is 83¢ per \$1,000 per year. We do not believe it necessary to carry burglary insurance on this equipment.
- c. We recommend that in lieu of insuring the valuable papers located in the office that they be microfilmed.
- d. The Board may want to consider carrying a blanket fidelity bond on its employees. This would cover loss resulting from theft of School District property as well as money. We do not have an estimate of premium for this coverage at this time.
- e. Each claim for loss or damage shall be adjusted separately and from the amount of each adjusted claim the sum of \$100.00 shall be deducted.



 - (1) There needs to be an intermediate unit (Office similar to the present office of county school superintendent.)
 - (2) The present rural school district should be continued with a change in name.
 - (3) The powers and duties of the intermediate district board should be defined.
 - (4) These powers and duties should be vested in the board.
 - (5) The county school superintendent or intermediate district superintendent should be the executive officer of the board and should carry out the powers and duties under the direction of the board.
 - (6) The intermediate district should be financed locally with no state assistance
 - (7) Those services which apply to all districts should be defined and these should be financed by a uniform tax levy in the entire intermediate district.
 - (8) Provision should be made to furnish any lawful service requested by component districts on a contract basis with the cost of such services being paid solely by the districts benefiting.
 - (9) Permissive legislation should be provided which would establish the machinery for voluntary consolidation of two or more intermediate districts.

- (10) Where it is deemed more advantageous, a local district should be able to contract for services from an intermediate district other than the one in which it is located.
- (11) Intermediate districts should be authorized to contract for services with each other.

This had been done with the idea of getting certain amounts of printing done for the small schools on this basis. The County Office has also used this operation from time to time on a time and material basis, but is fast approaching the time where they will be requiring a considerable amount of multilith work. As a budgetary item, the Board will need to consider in which direction to move in this area; whether

it should contract all the work out with local printers or to try to make greater use of the present multilith situation.

After considerable discussion, as to the merits of operating the present multilith, as opposed to using private printers, Director Ray Swanson moved that the Superintendent be instructed to work with Mr. Parks to explore the details further of the present Court House multilith operation, how the County Office can get greater use of this equipment, and report back to the Board at the January meeting. This motion was seconded by Director Leeper and carried.

Summer Forestry Camp discussed c. The 1961 Summer Forestry Camp was discussed by Board members and Commissioners and all agreed that this was a desirable and most encouraging program.

The Board members expressed to the Commissioners their desire that more boys be involved in the camp, if possible, for the 1962 summer program.

The Commissioners indicated that this would be possible and that they were planning to present to their budget committee plans for the operation of the 1962 program.

County
Office space situation

The problem of County Office space was discussed. As the law now stands, the County Commissioners are obligated to furnish the County School Superintendent with an office in the County Court House, or available location, and furnish necessary office furniture. The Lane County Board is wondering if they move into other activities such as guidance center, curriculum materials center, etc.; what the Commissioners policy would be relative to space. The Commissioners indicated that other space in the Court House was extremely limited, and it was their feeling if the County School Office were to enter into other services that the Board think in terms of renting space. It was indicated that it might be possible to arrange additional space on the main floor of

the Court House by moving one department and doing considerable additional construction on the fourth floor.

Director Richards suggested that the Board defer further discussion on this subject, and that the Superintendent work with Mr. Parks on a concrete proposal, as well as to allow the Board members time to think about this problem.

- 9. Reports were heard on various activities:
 - a. Mr. Tom Dodson, Special Education Director, reported on the present guidance center study. At the present time, he is involved in making a county-wide survey relative to potential school drop-outs in the elementary grades, plus the drop-out problem in the secondary schools, and that further guidance center discussion would be delayed until these statistics had been gathered.
 - b. The Lane County Education Television proposed program for the 1962-63 school year was presented and discussed. The Superintendent reported that the majority of the school districts in the county had indicated they would be willing to participate on a contractual basis in a county-wide education television program. It would mean that each district would probably be asked to contribute something in the neighborhood of \$1.50 per ADM for the support of such a program for the next school year. As it is tentatively projected, the Eugene District would administer this program and the County Office would work with them in a coordinating way. The Board discussed this situation relative to the administration of the program and instructed the Superintendent to work closely with the superintendents and coordinating council on this program.
 - c. The possible establishment of a Lane County instructional materials center was also discussed. Mr. Bill Jones, Assistant Superintendent of the Bethel School District is heading a committee to study this. The Board indicated that they are very much interested in Mr. Jones

making a presentation on this proposed center as soon as possible. Perhaps this could be worked into the January 3rd meeting.



He also stated that he did not feel that the Eugene Board would object to using the westerly right-of-way line of the railroad property on this proposed change, instead of the easterly right-of-way line.

The several patrons from the Bethel district voiced opposition to this change, citing that if it were made there would probably be many students walking along Maxwell Road to attend the Eugene schools and they felt that this might be equally as dangerous as the present situation where the bus is crossing the railroad.

Several patrons from the area were also present to speak in favor of the transfer of property. A Mr. Adams stated that much research had been done prior to petitioning for this transfer. He also stated that many of the petitioners felt as if the students of the area were being made pawns of the Southern Pacific Railroad due to a dispute over the amount of assessed value in this transfer. He also stated that in prior years students of this area had attended the Eugene schools on an exchange basis, whereby students of the Eugene district in other areas were attending the Bethel schools. He further stated that the petitioners felt the railroad constitutes a hazard in that it is an unmarked crossing at Irving. He stated that the petitioners felt that the schools in the Eugene area which were closer to their homes could be attended by the students with less chance of accidents occurring.

A Mrs. Yates of this area presented a mileage table showing the respective distances from the area to the Eugene schools and to the Bethel schools. The table indicated that the Eugene schools were considerably closer.

Mr. Powers, the Superintendent of the Bethel district, stated that he felt that a boundary change at this time might possible jeopardize reorganization of the Bethel area. He did not personally believe that a transfer could be accomplished before September.





- 2. Party of the First Part agrees that the services he has contracted to perform under this contract shall be rendered by him or under his personal supervision and that the work will be faithfully performed with care and diligence.
- 3. 

Dear Mrs. Klinge:

In response to your request for alternate methods of handling the situation in Fiddle Creek, School District No. 170J, we suggest the following possibilities.

Alternate No. I

Step. 1. Petition Lane County Boundary Board to consolidate School District 170J with Florence School District 97J, under ORS 330.110, etc. This will leave Area "A" shaded in blue on the map, the Douglas County area, subject to double taxation for high school purposes since it will be a unified district, Florence, and also in the Reedsport Union High School District --- To correct this situation:

Step 2. The Florence School Board should request the Douglas County Boundary Board to remove area "A" from Reedsport Union High - under ORS 335.338. If this action is refused by the boundary board, then:

Step 3. Petition the Douglas County Boundary Board to remove Area "A" from School District 97J and annex it to Gardiner School District 9 under ORS 329.730.

Alternate No. II

Step 1. Petition Douglas County Boundary Board to consolidate School District 170J with Gardiner School District 9.

Step 2. If step 1 is successful, petition to include Area "B" in Lane County in Reedsport Union High School, under ORS 335.342.
