Northwest Youth Corps established the OutDoor High School in 1997 to serve youth who find the traditional school setting unable to meet their needs. OutDoor School (ODS) offers a combination of hands-on learning, conservation work, applied science, and academics. ODS prepares youth for the workplace by emphasizing basic skills and career readiness, while providing a solid academic foundation for students interested in pursuing a college education.

## **About the School**

- > 8 staff members to 56 students
- > Accredited by the Northwest Association of Accredited Schools
- > Students can graduate with a High School Diploma.
- > Upon entry, students are assessed to determine appropriate academic group placement
- > Instruction primarily occurs in small groups and students can move to other groups based on their academic performance
- > Cost to referring district is 80% of ADM; free to students
- > Hours are 8:40-3:30 and all activities are initiated from the school site
- > Students must provide own, or be provided transportation to and from Outdoor High School.
- > About ½ of the students referred are from 4J. See District Specific Information sheet.
- > School has a framework for PBIS, with schoolwide expectations clearly posted throughout the building: "Be Respectful, Responsible, Compassionate and Safe." Students have the ability to "buy" Columbia Sportswear with points earned for positive behavior.

## **Programs**-Students are enrolled in one of the following:

## Field Studies

- > Half of each month is spent as a member of a Field Team performing conservation projects and participating in hands-on field studies projects
- > Academics are taught in the field
- > Twice a year Wednesday to Wednesday "spike" trip to explore the Oregon environment

## Classroom

- > Small-group academic setting
- Designed for students not interested in the outdoors or who have not demonstrated the necessary skills to engage in the Field Studies program

## Subject: Registration of Private Alternative Education Program

Pursuant to ORS 336.635 and OAR 581-021-0072, the application for Northwest Youth Corps at 2621 Augusta St Eugene, OR, to be registered as a private alternative education program for 2012-2013 has been processed and filed.

A registered private alternative program must be in compliance with ORS 336.631, ORS 336.635, ORS 336.337, OAR 581-021-0045, OAR 581-021-0072, or the Standards for Private Alternative Programs. Those found not to be in compliance will be removed from the Oregon Department of Education's list of registered private alternative programs and will not be eligible to receive public school funds through contracts with school districts.
