Lane Education Service District (ESD) services are mandated by law to include:


- programs for children with special needs

We received \$45,000 over three years for the Happy Friends Baking Company to donate breakfast bars to Food for Lane County and mentor other districts with Person-Centered-Planning. We also launched the Green Friends Gardening Project at Churchill High School.

## **Grants in Aid & Other Special Education Programs**

#### Early Intervention / Early Childhood Special Education (EI/ECSE)

**Early Intervention/Early Childhood Special Education** – Lane ESD sub-contracts with the University of Oregon's Early Childhood Consultation Assessment Referral and Evaluation Services [EC CARES] to provide coordination of services to all eligible preschool children with disabilities (birth to age five) and their families.

#### Lane Regional Program

**Regional Low Incidence Program** – Lane ESD is the Contractor for Regional Program Services for children who have low-incidence disabilities: visual impairment (VI), deaf / hard of hearing (DHH), deaf/blindness (DB), severe orthopedic impairment (OI), Autism spectrum disorder (ASD), and traumatic brain injury (TBI). Lane ESD subcontracts with Eugene 4J for the following services: VI; DHH; DB; OI; and, TBI.

ARRA funds supported Lane County districts in expanding opportunities for students with low incidence disabilities including, autism spectrum disorder (ASD), vision impairments, deaf/hard of hearing, deaf/blindness, severe orthopedic impairments, and traumatic brain injury. Examples include: assistive technology, software, updating of the augmentative and alternative communication device loaning library, curricula, specialized equipment & materials, expansion of the ASD lending library, professional development and assessment tools.

#### Fee-based Special Education Programs

**Martin Luther King, Jr. Education Center** The Department of Labor renewed funding for the grant it awarded in 2008 to the Department of Youth Services, with whom Lane ESD co-operates the MLK, Jr Ed Center for adjudicated youth. The supplemental funding allowed us to once again offer a 4-week summer program at no cost to districts. We were also able to retain most of the additional teaching staff that we added the previous year which allowed us to provide a broader curriculum.

**Augmentative Communication Services** (AC) Specialists assist in evaluating and providing intervention for students with severe communication disorders.

**Speech Services** are provided to several Lane County districts through a contract with Lane ESD for a part-time Speech Language Pathologist (SLP), which is a difficult to fill position.

**Direction Service** is a non-profit agency that provides information and referral services to parents and districts regarding services for students with disabilities. Direction Service coordinates the delivery of services to families who have children with disabilities. Direction Service reduces family stress, confusion, frustration, and isolation as well as reduces the lifetime service costs to children with disabilities; and encourages an informed partnership between families and schools to optimize student learning.

Description

School Improvement (SI) services provide a wide range of professional development, technical assistance, and on-going support to teachers, administrators, and other school staff to implement effective, evidence-based programs and research instructional best-practices to enhance academic success for all students.

SI Specialists and staff provide:

- general education services in curriculum content, curriculum alignment, teaching and classroom strategies;
- regional facilitation and support in career & technical education for high schools;
- coordination of prevention programs to improve school climate and enhance academic achievement;
- instructional support for students eligible for migrant education and English Language-learning students.

## School Improvement Funds (SIF) – Services to Districts 2009 – 2010

In June 2007, the Oregon Legislative Assembly adopted Senate Bill 318, which requires the Department of Education (ODE) to award School Improvement Fund (SIF) grants to school districts, education service districts, as well as the Youth Corrections and Juvenile Detention education programs for activities resulting in increases in student achievement.

Lane ESD provides direct services to districts for eligible activities. Eligible activities include the following menu items:

- 1. Early childhood support including establishing, maintaining, or expanding quality prekindergarten programs and full-day kindergarten programs;
- 2. Class size reduction with an emphasis on the reduction of kindergarten through grade three class sizes;
- 3. Increases in instructional time including summer programs and before / afterschool programs;
- 4. Mentoring, teacher retention, and professional development;
- 5. Remediation, alternative learning, and student retention;
- 6. Services to at-risk youth;
- 7. Programs to improve a student achievement gap between student groups identified by culture, poverty, language or race, and other student groups;
- 8. Vocational education programs;
- 9. Literacy programs;

The Bethel Consortium for Indian Education serves eight school districts: Bethel, Creswell, C-A-L, Fern Ridge Junction City, Lowell, Pleasant Hill, and South Lane. Lane ESD is contracted to provide the personnel and administrative services to consortium members.

The students we serve must be members of a Federal or State recognized tribe or be related to a tribal member. We provide our students culturally relevant academic tutoring and mentoring to meet the Oregon standards in math and reading/language arts. In addition to the tutoring and mentoring services, we provide weekly Culture Classes where students can enrich their knowledge and experience with Native cultures and peoples.

During the summer of 2010, we provided **40 Indian Education students** a summer academic enrichment program at the University of Oregon **Many Nations Long House.**

During 2009-10 academic year, we provided 192 hours of cultural presentations in our participating school districts and served 4,226 students.

# **TECHNOLOGY & INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY**

#### Description

#### Funding

Lane ESD's Technology Services provides managed network connectivity supporting technology use in 14 of Lane County's 16 districts, and Instructional Technology Services to all 16 districts. In addition to network and internet access, Lane ESD provides:

- Funding, coordination, and engineering support to district initiatives;
- Centralized coordination of online learning;
- Professional development and direct instructional technology support to teachers and school staff;
- Network engineering and support in the design of districts' infrastructures;
- Online instructional support applications (e.g., Blackboard, blog)
- Video conference hubbing and technical support (to facilitate distance learning and to minimize travel costs associated with administrative meetings);
- Technology lab check-out for classroom use including laptop computer labs, digital camera labs, GPS labs, and Classroom Performance Systems (CPS)
- Assistance in the writing, coordination, and implementation of grant activities

#### 2009-10 Highlights

Efforts of Lane ESD technology services staff resulted in an average up-time of greater than 99% for the network core, wide area network, and all associated applications.

In 2009-10 Technology Services offset nearly all costs associated with federally mandated email archiving. Technology Services also saved Lane County districts over **\$47,000 in online professional development subscriptions** supporting technology training for teachers and for district technology staff.

Lane ESD's Instructional Technology **check out labs** (including portable laptop labs, GPS labs, CPS, PC microphones, and digital cameras) provided services to 14 schools throughout 8 school districts in Lane County.

Lane ESD succeeded in winning three grants associated with bringing high speed connectivity to three districts, as well as assisting two districts in the successful application for two additional grants to fund extensive infrastructure improvement. The grants and matching ESD funds covered over \$190,000 in implementation costs.

With 2009-10 as a pilot year, Lane ESD implemented the Online Options program, providing districts with access to online courses for credit recovery, AP, and elective classes from three accredited providers.




## Revenue & Expense Summary 2009-10 Expenditures \$32,648,000

By Oregon statute, ESD services must include at least the following: programs for student with special needs, school improvement services, technology, administrative services, and mandated services such as attendance and truancy services. Over the past several years, Special Education expenses have remained near 76% of total actual expenditures.

Lane ESD's annual State School Fund allocation is 4.75% of the County's total State School Fund allocation. By law, ESDs must spend 90% of their State School Fund revenue on services to districts.
